
#### A big THANK YOU to all our volunteers!


The impact of the morning's work is potentially huge, not least the enthusiastic response of the community volunteer workforce. Thank you to all those who came along, prepared to slosh around in the muddy conditions, including some from out-of-town!

"A Healthy Coliban Catchment" instigated by North Central Catchment Management Authority working with Hepburn Shire Council and Quarry Street Reserve Committee of Management has now completed Stage One at Quarry St Reserve. This was the result of months of planning with several agencies, starting with the launch last December. The local Project Manager is Lauren Linke, HSC Environmental Works Officer who has organised the critical elements of the operation right down to providing the big box of tools and the Men's Shed for the BBQ.

This patch in the middle of town can play a significant part in habitat restoration on one of the Coliban River's many creeks. It demonstrates possibility, correcting the impact on our environment of recent times and practices. It is a small way to honour the Country we live on.

The Reserve CoM will move to Stage 2, while continuing weeding and maintenance. Next year will mark 40 years since the Trentham Lions commenced work to create the Reserve, including forming the lake. 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#### **Energy Resilient Trentham-Sparking Conversations**

What is the likely impact for your household if the electricity grid has a five-day outage? How will you manage; what are your household energy needs; what can't you live without? What resilience measures do you have in place at household level? Does it matter if you can't access the pharmacy or food supplies or fuel?

What is the impact for your business if you have a five-day outage? Will you lose stock? Will you be able to trade? The Energy Resilient Trentham project is helping our community plan for these questions at household and community levels.

Energy resilience: In the July issue of the Trumpet, we reported that our consultants, Yarra Energy Foundation, presented their findings for the proposed islandable microgrid based on the Market Street transformer. Their report found that while technically feasible, the concept of a battery, generator, more solar PV and associated control system was not financially viable at the scale required, if not owned and operated by the distribution network service provider – Powercor, rather than a third party as had been proposed. 

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#### **Naturalism in Garden Design**

The history of garden design can be seen as a dance between two trends, formality and informality. Each culture and era has tended to favour one or the other. Think of the strict symmetrical precision of Versailles, the soft flowing lines of Japanese gardens or the rustic naturalness or the oft-maligned 70's Australian bush garden.

Naturalism in garden design is simply an approach that seeks inspiration directly from nature, aiming to look spontaneous and organic rather than ordered and contrived. Some international naturalistic garden styles such as the New Perennial movement have had less impact and appeal in Australia, but I've never entirely figured out why. Possibly because if people are wanting to try something different, they will sway towards a native garden.

A garden is never really a true slice of the natural world; there are too many human demands placed upon it. For example, privacy, spaces for recreation and play, ease of access through to important areas, bushfire risk management, sun mitigation, etc etc.

However, the feeling of being in touch with nature is often the primary driver of purchasing a house with a garden, so a naturalistic design addresses that desire. The informality of naturalistic gardens also tends to reflect our lifestyles and personalities... very few Australians present themselves to the world as European aristocrats, so having a garden filled with the style cues of that era can feel a bit jarring!

Naturalistic gardens are not necessarily low maintenance. A creative and horticulturally informed eye is needed to thin and shape plants, put in new specimens to fill gaps etc. Formal gardens often have fewer different elements to juggle so maintenance is often streamlined; trim the hedges mow the lawn and then the picture looks complete.



Naturalistic gardens often succeed best when high-quality built elements bring strength and interest to plantings which can otherwise look formless. Think split-stone crazy paving, irregular shapes, corten steel etc. Water features and artfully placed boulders can bring a sense of variety to the picture, as well as bringing wildlife to the garden.

Next time you are out walking in nature see what inspiration you can bring to your garden. Gardens are a dance between order and chaos, so enjoy finding the balance that brings the most joy to you.

#### Jonathon Ogden and the Origins of Trentham

The reasons why the countryside has settlements where they are presently are many and various. Usually near water, and frequently at the best creek or river crossing in the vicinity, settlements were convenient points on the way to somewhere else. First a pub or store would form a nucleus, grow, and eventually become a village of township.

In the case of Trentham, however, the model doesn't quite fit, in that the town is near two smallish creeks and not on any major roads, pretty much in the middle of the triangle of Daylesford, Kyneton and Woodend.

Jonathan Ogden can lay a fair claim to being the cause of Trentham's being where it is, and, with his wife Mary, becoming, quite likely, its first permanent European family as the town grew from a lonely place of muddy tracks and gigantic forest into a thriving township connected to the rest of the world with telegraph and rail. Arriving around 1853, the Ogdens spent the remainder of their life here until his death in 1888 and hers in 1895. He is buried at the Trentham Cemetery.

Ogden was the proprietor of a hotel, called 'Ogden's Inn' or the 'Forest Hotel', or variations thereof. The 'Forest' was a reference to the area being known before its official survey and naming as 'Clowes' Forest', being on the southern boundary of the Clowes brothers' run.

Ogden's Inn is first recorded on the map of a survey by John D Daniell dated 7 November 1855. On the bend of the road are shown two small buildings and a larger rectangular one.

The map dated 3 May 1859 of squatting runs and surveyed lots in the County of Dalhousie is the first to pinpoint the location of Ogden's hotel. It shows lot 23 on the north—west corner of the intersection of Pearsons Road and the Kyneton—Trentham road purchased by Ogden, and marks the site of the inn.

(You can still see a line of mature cypress trees on the corner, probably planted as a windbreak, possibly by Ogden himself. This map also shows Isaac Pearson had purchased lots 20 and 21 along the present Pearsons Road.)

But even more significant is that the survey ends in the south west in a line passing within metres of the Inn, marking the line of the present Victoria Street and its continuation to the Pearsons Road corner. When the time came to survey a township of Trentham in 1864 the line became the township's northern boundary.

#### **Community news**

Congratulations to the hardworking Hall Committee for organising a great event and to all those who ventured out. All proceeds fund the maintenance of what is an important community asset.

Reminder – **Trentham Primary School** will celebrate its 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary on 23 November.

#### **Council news**

In last month's Trentham Trumpet I noted the audited financial statements for 2024/25 were adopted and that there must be a comprehensive and **critical review of the 25/26 budget** and greater diligence in financial decision-making for Council to be financially sustainable. Councillors will conduct a "mid-year" review of the 2025/26 budget in February next year. The review will be guided by the financial results for the first half-year.

Similarly, councillors will soon complete the task to quantify the remaining **performance indicators in the Council Plan**. The 2024/25 financial statements, the 2025/26 budget and the four-year Plan are all available on Council's website.

Council has just completed another round of consultation on specific aspects of the **draft town structure plans**. The process to adopt final plans calls for further consultation before they are submitted to the state government. Like many of you I am acutely aware of the need to preserve the character and amenity of our towns while catering for the expected growth in population. While I didn't really need the reminder my recent travels overseas reinforced how others have successfully managed to retain character and protect the natural environment while catering for growth and managing visitation through tourism. I strongly encourage you to take an active interest in the proposed town structure plans and have your say.

While on planning matters a proposed **9-lot development in Mulcahys Rd**. was the subject of a recent briefing: including attendance by objectors, and will be tabled at the November Council meeting for decision.

The much-anticipated **outdoor gym equipment** is due to be installed at the sportsground during November. Equipment will include a pod set up with a combination of static and dynamic equipment, including: Aerobic walker (cardio), Back extension (back strength), Tai chi wheels (mobility), Bench press (chest strength) and Stretch station (full body strength and cardio). More detail is on Council's website.

Reminder – **November is free green waste month**. Ahead of summer and the fire risk season this is an opportunity to dispose of green waste at the transfer station free of charge. Show your rates notice to verify you are a local!

I have requested the public **rubbish bins in High St** be replaced... or at the very least cleaned.

And the wait is finally over – Parks Victoria have opened a **new toilet block at Trentham Falls**.

Council will hold a statutory meeting on 18 November to **elect the Mayor and Deputy Mayor for the coming year** and appoint councillors to various committees. With a fragile financial outlook, declining customer satisfaction, major challenges in town planning, an urgent need to strengthen relationships with the community and improve transparency and flow of information the outlook calls for inclusive and strategic leadership.



Well, we've had the heat and sun of spring, as well as its storms. The days are getting longer and the trees around the lake are clothed in bright blossom, while those in Market Street are happily being torn apart by grumpy cockatoos. In the church, week has followed week in the season of Ordinary Time. That doesn't mean that extraordinary things haven't been happening.

Last market day, the Rev. Charles Sherlock, from St. George's Anglican Church and myself came together for the annual blessing of the animals. This is held each year, on the first market day after the feast of St. Francis. This year about thirty dogs, willing or unwilling, received a blessing. Each year I wait in hope for a cow, or a goat, or even a cat, but it was the dogs that turned up. Large and small, grumpy and happy, they all got their blessing. Although we did make it clear that the blessing came with no guarantee of improved behaviour.

Another significant event in this last month was the establishment of Saint Mary's Meadow. This was formerly just an empty piece of land in front of the church and between High St. and Bridge St. Now it has been fenced and signage and a picnic table added, providing a place for Interior Design

families to picnic at the eastern end of town. A place for dogs, and kids, to run and for adults to simply sit and enjoy some quiet. Planned. future development will include improved access for the mobility impaired.

#### Ellie's Napkin Rings

My friend Ellie is getting married, and has decided to use a wedding gift registry with one of the larger homeware stores. Some people openly dislike the concept of being directed to a particular store; for others, this approach is a huge time saver. Ellie and her fiancé are experienced entertainers, with plenty of platters, serving boards and utensils between them. Curious to see what items they'd selected, I visited the chosen store. I could see straight away that Ellie and her husband-to-be were looking for contributions that complemented their existing dinnerware.

The sales assistant guided me through Ellie's selected items; the list included requests for replacement plates and glassware. In some ways this limited the scope for me using my imagination: why three red wine glasses, or seven champagne flutes; or a cruet dish, place mat, table runner, or three identical tablecloths? I didn't think egg cups are very romantic, but these appeared in the list, too!

Among the silver requests was a set of 10 simple napkin rings. The helpful sales assistant gave me a demonstration of how to fold and insert napkins in various ways, using different patterned or coloured linens. You can dress napkins up or down, contributing to a more casual or formal table setting. I've always wondered: where does the idea of napkin rings come from?

Some might think that napkin rings belong to a bygone era, when households had specific cutlery relating to certain foods. Think Downton Abbey and a table laid with a confusing array of cutlery, including fish knives, oyster forks, salad forks, and so on.

Linen napery was always incredibly expensive, requiring time and effort to clean. Rather than laundering between

uses, house guests reused their napkins from the previous meal. Napkin rings were an identifier, originally made of coloured woods, with different colours or designs used to distinguish which napkin belonged to which guest. At each meal, you looked out for your napkin ring, provided you could remember which design was yours!



The Victorians were great innovators when it came to displaying their wealth and status, replacing wooden napkin rings with gold or silver rings laid out on their tables, with their servants laundering used napkins and replacing with fresh napery for every meal.

These days napkin rings come in multiple styles and materials, matching all tastes and suiting all occasions. If you have a minute or two to spare, search 'napkin folds with rings' - you may be surprised at how many YouTube videos are available online, ranging from the simple fold to an origami-like challenge!

The humble napkin ring has become a stylish addition to our table, moving from something so clever and practical, into a beautiful place setting decoration. A perfect gift for Ellie and her fiancé!



#### 'Blue likes to scatter' - really?

At the science museum, then housed at the State Library (mid-1980s), the above 'explanation' featured next to a linear diagram in clear daylight that left out the deep dark of outer space that forms the background for the sunlit atmosphere that surrounds the earth.

Viewed from an airplane 10km above this atmosphere the deep space appears black, not blue. Even at the top of Mount Buller the space directly around the sun on a clear day looks dark. The quasi-scientific explanation in the precursor of "science works" sounded rather childish: 'blue likes to scatter'. I hope that in its now Docklands location, light phenomena are demonstrated in dark space.

Even Newton knew how to experiment with light in a darkened room, although he drew his conclusion too hasty: Newton published his Colour Theory after only a fortnight. Goethe, who attempted to repeat Newton's experiment, took forty years before he published his Farbenlehre = Colour Study, complete with colour charts for readers to see for themselves. Newton's book shows only 'lines', no 'colours'. Newton thought mathematics, Goethe thought in images. For Newton a prism 'splits' the light, Goethe observed the triangular shape of a prism and concluded that it 'displaced' or 'shifted' an image for the viewer...

It took Goethe's sharp observation only a split second to notice the difference between the narrow hole that Newton had used and the much wider hole he himself used when repeating the experiment. Seen through the prism the wider hole shows colours at its edges: strip of blue at the one edge; strip of yellow at the other. When seen or projected through the prism the strips overlap, which means the yellow and blue produce green in the mix...

The painter William Turner didn't use tubes with green paint in his landscapes or seascapes. He painted atmospheres, letting shades of blue and yellow themselves blend into green where it occasionally showed in nature. Dutch painters before him mixed their paints themselves, didn't need green at all, even though their countryside, especially Holland, shows a lot of natural green...

As to the colour blue in nature, a simple rule tends to prevail: seen through a light transparent medium a darker object appears blue, example: distant mountains; a lighter object seen through a dark transparent medium appears red, example: Sunrise and Sunset, showing spectacularly red through densely polluted skies, as above large cities.

'blue likes to scatter'? Forget about it! A simple formula instead:

light over dark > blue... dark over light > red

On study-leave later that year I visited science museums in Brighton UK and San Francisco USA, both museums displayed colour phenomena in dark rooms as Newton did.




enjoyed by an audience of 85. Annie's story reinforced how proud we can feel living in such a wonderful community.

#### France 1916



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
