CARETAKER PERIOD

Council is in the Election Period (Caretaker) until 6pm on 26 October 2024. We have a statutory responsibility to ensure that the elections are conducted fairly, equitably, and without influence from current Council operations. Caretaker period is a time when we limit certain activities – to ensure decisions made are not influenced by, or likely to influence, the upcoming election. During this time, we don't make major decisions, commit to large expenditures, or enter significant contracts that could potentially influence a voter's decision. We will also scale back our communication and engagement activities, so you'll see less social media activity and advertisements.

Happy Birthday Trentham Lions!

Trentham Lions celebrated its 40th anniversary in September.

Seventy-nine current and retired Trentham and District Lions members, special guests and representatives of many of Trentham's volunteer groups came together for an evening of fine food, fun and fellowship at The Factory. Caterer Emma James and her team produced and served a delicious meal. Lion Tim Walsh did a great job as MC for the evening, which included an interview with two of the original 1984 'pioneers', Neil Rothe (Charter Club President) and Richard Burke (Charter member).

Tim listed some of the projects and activities which have been undertaken to serve the community over the 40 years the club has been operating. The first project being the development of the Quarry Street Reserve now known as Lions Park, completed in 1992 as a wonderful asset for the town.

A selection of the many community projects undertaken over the last 40 years are listed:

- Quarry Street Lions Park. First major project undertaken by Charter members.
- Supply of birthday cakes. Recipients are all residents 80 years or older.
- Carols in the Park. A signature event involving participation from various artists, choirs, technicians, CFA and Primary School.
- Regular Working Bee's. Such as the Trentham Cemetery, and supply of firewood for residents in need.
- Old Time Dance. A very popular monthly event run jointly by the Trentham & Districts Historical Society, Lions Club and dedicated individuals. Ceased during COVID.
- Provision of emergency assistance. Ad hoc financial, in kind or physical help when required.
- Australia Day and Anzac Day. Annual public events involving the RSL, Hepburn Shire and Mayor, Lions Club, Trentham Cemetery Trust, CFA, Trentham Primary School and others.
- Trentham Farmers Market. A major monthly signature event involving stall holders, various volunteer groups and Lions members.
- Trentham Good Friday Collection. A significant source of funds for the Royal Children's Hospital involving Lions, CFA, Trentham Primary School and other collection volunteers.
- Caring for Carers. Supporting those who find themselves caring 24/7 for loved ones.
- Winter Twilight Night & Spudfest. Joining with the community to support local traders.



- Firewood. Splitting and supplying firewood for those in need. Support from Hepburn Shire Community Grants, Steve Smith Firewood and the McLaren's for providing the wood yard.
- Raffles. Regular raffles including firewood, monthly markets, Lions events etc. Organised by John & Bette McLaren with prizes from local traders.
- Special Projects. Such as the Alzheimer's program, Lions Hearing and Medical Assistance Dogs program, Lions Skin Check and Awareness Unit (free skin screening throughout Victoria). Support for the Australian Lions Foundation (ALF), Lion's clubs International foundation and Australian Lions Wellbeing Foundation (ALWF).

Our aim going forward will be to continue partnering with community, charity and volunteer groups, local, state and federal government, local businesses, Trentham residents and any other like-minded people aligned with our Mission: To improve the lives of people in our community by supporting them in need, and our Vision: Serving our community.

We salute all the voluntary groups, businesses and community-minded people of Trentham for your kind and generous support and acknowledge the great community work you do. We look forward to working with you in the future to continue achieving good outcomes for our community.

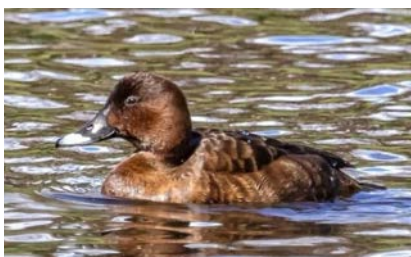
Founded by the Late Mario Satori in 2003, The East Trentham Fellowship quietly supports locals in times of need, plus local schools, CFA, and sporting teams.

Quarry Street Reserve

One of the first signs of a change of season is when the Reserve gets mowed again! Or you may be watching the bird life, but it seems there's no ducklings yet. The wattles are out, particularly on the island in the lake, along with the gorse which needs to be removed! The new plants under the bird protection domes are starting to look like it's safe to 'let them out'.

One project recently completed is the (mostly) dry creek bed between the pavilion and the toilet block, as in the photo. The *Dianella tasmanica* in left front corner has been a test case, planted a year ago and is well-established. Other plants now settling in are a mix of *Dianella*, *Poa*, and *Lomandra* and should look that good next year too. There is weed matting under most of the rocks.

There was excitement recently when a newcomer to the lake was spotted. After a little discussion and research, it turns out to be a Female Hardhead, "a streamlined brown duck with dark head, white tip to bill... likely



to nest in well-hidden cup of reeds or other waterside vegetation." (The Slater Field Guide to Australian Birds) Photo thanks to Jane Herbert! So it's worth keeping a lookout!



Paul Bibby, one of the members of the fellowship said they were super impressed by the outcome and thanked the gallery for all their efforts to come up with such a result, and he also thanked the community that got behind it as well. Paul also said this donation will help enormously with the work the organisation does in the community, especially now during these tough economic times.

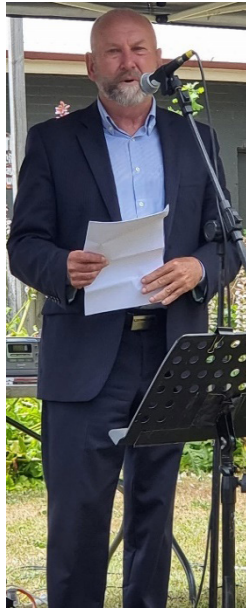
Hepburn Shire Council Elections

When I stood for election in 2020, I undertook to do three things:

1. To secure a better deal for our end of the Shire with regard to Council investment.
2. To make myself available and represent your interests professionally and respectfully and to act as your local voice.

As your councillor for the past 4 years I have been integral in ensuring support for important local projects:

- Design and construction of The Mechanics Trentham
- Construction of new facilities at the Trentham sportsground and Quarry St. Reserve
- Repair of the Trentham tennis courts
- Creation of a temporary off-leash dog park
- Faithful restoration of the Bullarto rail station
- Secured funding for significant improvements to Lyonville community hall

As your ward councillor I supported the Trentham community following the devastation of the June 2021 storm and as Mayor I provided compassionate, strong leadership in the aftermath of the November 2023 Daylesford tragedy.

In collaboration with passionate locals I ensured that valuable and crucial community feedback was received by Council on the draft town structure plans, which led to vital revisions being made in order to reflect the views of the community. If re-elected I will continue to listen, work hard and deliver for our community.

Now I need your help.

- Getting re-elected will be more challenging under the new unsubdivided model. There are 12 candidates competing for 7 places. 9 of these 12 are from the larger population centres Daylesford and Creswick. Trentham, Lyonville, Bullarto, Glenlyon and Musk need strong representation, as do all other small population centres across the Shire.
- Hepburn Shire Council is facing significant, well-documented challenges – especially its financial outlook – and that will take thoughtful and strategic decision making to repair. I have an extensive career background in finance, have worked as a CFO and senior executive, and have always been honest and transparent with ratepayers about the issues we face.
- It is more important than ever to have trustworthy, intelligent, independent and reliable councillors in place who can grasp the challenges and make the necessary strategic and financial decisions for the benefit of the whole Shire.
- We need some fresh ideas and thinking. I support Cameron Stone in his bid to be elected. As publican of the Royal Hotel Daylesford, Cameron has strong links into the community, has demonstrated extraordinary leadership and has extensive business knowledge, nous and experience.
- I am supporting the re-election of my colleagues Lesley Hewitt and Don Henderson.
- I also support a stronger presence of women on Council because local womens' voices are vital in decision making.

Hepburn Shire Council Election

I was elected in 2020 to represent Birch ward (Daylesford/Hepburn Springs) and am re-nominating for council.

With the introduction of the unsubdivided wards I wanted to take the opportunity to introduce myself to you in Trentham and the surrounding areas. Incoming Councillors will have to make decisions for all people across the Shire, not just for the areas where they live/work. I have tried to do this in the past four years supporting funding for projects across the Shire including the Trentham Mechanics, the Trentham Sports Pavilion and the Bullarto Railway Station, and have worked well with Cr Brain Hood, the Coliban Councillor to gain an understanding of the issues and concerns of those in Coliban.

Brian and I have served as Mayor and Deputy Mayor to each other on two occasions (me a mayor in 2020 - 2021 and as deputy in 2022 - 2023). Some of my community connections that have also helped me understand the issues across the whole Shire have included as a Director of Hepburn Health Service (now Central Highlands Rural Health), Words in Winter Committee (2010 - 2014) and Daylesford Riding for the Disabled (2008 - ongoing) with riders from all over the Shire.

Trentham Tales

The Trent Nation Brewery

Did you know that Trentham once boasted a brewery?

Joseph Barnes was our first brewer when, in 1874, in partnership with Mr Richard Goodge, he established the Goodge & Barnes breweries in Barry's Reef and Trentham. Following bankruptcy in 1879, the Barry's Reef brewery was liquidated, but the Trentham operation remained active, trading its way from insolvency to success.

The Goodge & Barnes Brewery, Trentham - by 1888 the Joseph Barnes & Co Brewery - was located at 18 Blue Mount Rd. Water was drawn from wells on the property: the excellence of the brew being attributed to the superior quality of this water.

Later records show the land housed a weatherboard building used as the brewery, as well as a 5 roomed weatherboard cottage, a smiths shop and outhouses. Mechanical equipment included a 4hp engine and boiler.

Joseph Barnes arrived in the colonies from Cornwall in 1857, spending his early years in Castlemaine and Chewton, where, with wife Annie Bolton, he raised 7 children, ran an earlier brewery and became a respected and active member of the Chewton Borough Council. The Barnes' also ran several hotels across the district, including, the 'Junction Hotel', Tylden (cnr James Lane and Tylden Road). Annie soon took over its management, as she did others, including the Criterion in Castlemaine.

By the 1890s, the Barnes' had moved to Melbourne. The family owned, and Annie ran, the New York Hotel, where they lived during Joseph's lengthy confinement, and subsequent death in 1898, from 'dropsy' (oedema). Following his death, Joseph's son - also Joseph - took over the running of the Trentham brewery. However, in a tragic twist, just 6 weeks after Barnes Snr's burial, Joseph Jnr was also dead.

"Having attended the funeral of the late Mr Toomey of Trentham, [Joseph Jnr] contracted a cold, which rapidly developed into inflammation of the lungs. All possible was done for him by Dr Sleeman, of Trentham, ...but it terminated fatally at 11 o'clock on Monday night" (Kyneton Observer, October 1898). Faced with such sadness, in 1899 Annie Barnes chose to lease the brewery to the Nation brothers (James, Thomas, Alfred and Walter).

The Nations maintained the business in Blue Mount Road for some years, themselves living in Cosmo Road, before they went on, in 1908, to buy the operation. It was then moved to Kyneton, but kept the Trentham connection by calling itself "Nation's Trent Brewery, Kyneton". Sales apparently slumped following the move, attributed by many to the 'poorer quality' of the Kyneton water. By 1914, the breweries in both towns had closed. While the property and brewing equipment, was subsequently bought by the Kyneton & Trentham Breweries Ltd, the Trentham brewery itself never re-opened.

Ice Cream and Sorbet

I remember as a child my mother making her own ice cream. I liked chocolate, my sister preferred strawberry, and dad liked good old vanilla. There were fruit sorbets in season, and the occasional experiment with mint leaves, dry biscuits and different berries.

Just like our home interiors, the colour possibilities of ice cream are endless. I'm thinking about the fun you can have at the ice cream counter mixing colours and flavours. Textures and possibilities can inspire domestic spring interior updates, as well as pleasing our stomachs!

Pistachio is a slightly greyish off-green colour, as a paint colour it's subtle yet invigorating, soft and refreshing, without being too bold; a soft green colour in nature - every conceivable colour looks great paired with it.

Raspberry is a strong pink with blue undertones; it's flavoursome, a little tangy and appreciated by young and old. Being warm it's evocative, with feelings of passion, but not as fiery as rich cherry reds (that's another flavour combination, perhaps my favourite, little chunks of berry flavoured gelatine adding texture, backed with rich chocolate like a Cherry Ripe - simply divine!).

Deep pinks work well in traditional and contemporary homes, paired with rich jewel tones. Visually, I like the balance of chocolate and brighter colour contrasts.

Toffee and caramels blend perfectly with vanilla flavours. Always an easy go-to colour palette, they're all about understated elegance. Being a neutral base, these tones are perfect for showcasing your favourite possessions, without overloading your senses.

Adding softer whites makes colours lighter and creamier, more like pastel shades. Strawberries and peaches invigorate our senses, much like a fizz of effervescence. Or, if you prefer, call them corals and tangy oranges. Either way, they produce cozy spaces or elevate small décor details - perhaps a splash of colour across a cushion?



Bubble gums can be either a distinct bluish green or a blue-based pink; bold and youthful, with joyful energy. They are playful colours, definitely for smallish details in artwork or perhaps as summer table napery.

Now that we're coming closer to ice cream weather, consider how different flavour combinations result in a mix of their related colours. Is there a link between flavours and being attracted to the corresponding colours? I'm no expert, but I think there is!

Councillor's Report

Council meeting – Key outcomes from the September Council meeting were the adoption of the audited 23/24 financial statements and annual report; a report acknowledging the Local Government Inspectorate's conclusion of the Rex investigation; the awarding of a \$450,000 contract for sealed road patching works; and the awarding of a \$1m contract for roof restoration works at Daylesford Town hall.

The headlines from the 23/24 financial statements include – a deficit of \$9.88m for the 23/24 year. That is by far the largest deficit incurred by Council. After excluding grants and contributions used to fund capital works which were accounted for in the income statement, the adjusted underlying deficit was almost \$15.5m. The cash balance at 30 June 2024 was \$7.8m which is \$10.6m lower than the previous year, and \$4.8m less than what is needed to cover reserves, trust funds, deposits and the cost of partially completed projects carried forward into the 24/25 year. This reality, and the recently disclosed projected cash shortfall of \$4m pa, strongly suggests that corrective action must be urgently implemented in order to ensure Council's ongoing viability. Realigning Council's strategic direction and priorities to its constrained financial capacity would be a good start. The ability to secure such a turnaround is inherently linked to the upcoming Council election.

In a shock announcement the Local Government Inspectorate concluded that, after 5 years' of investigation, it would (a) not take any disciplinary or legal action against those responsible for the Rex fiasco and (b) that it would not issue ANY report on the matter. This extraordinary outcome denies the community, councillors and Council officers any transparency on what occurred and lacks any semblance of accountability. The LGI attributed their conclusion to a "lack of evidence". It should be remembered that Council officers back in 2018 self-reported the matter to IBAC and the LGI, taking the serious step of reporting to independent regulatory authorities out of their concerns. The LGI's announcement at least acknowledges the current councillor group and management team have implemented steps aimed at preventing a recurrence. The Rex fiasco cost Council and ratepayers \$5.5m and caused significant reputational damage. The September Council meeting noted the LGI's conclusion with significant disappointment. The CEO and I have sought assurance from the Attorney-General and Minister for Local Government that the Inspectorate has the necessary powers and resources to conduct investigations in a timely manner and to issue reports. It remains to be seen if this appalling outcome draws a line in the sand and ends the matter once and for all.

The \$1m works at Daylesford Town Hall will include the replacement of its roof. Further works to replace the entire electrical systems will be the subject of a future contract at an estimated cost of around \$800,000. The town hall was largely neglected during the years of misguided attention on the Rex. Work will continue to explore options and concept designs for the housing of the Daylesford library and the provision of new community facilities into the renovated town hall.

The September meeting ended in extraordinary circumstances. As noted in the publicly available minutes:

"17. CLOSE OF MEETING The meeting lapsed at 9:21pm for want of a quorum."

That situation was a shock ending to the meeting and Council's term ahead of the October election. I wish to put on record and assure everyone that I remained in my position chairing the meeting as Mayor and representing Coliban ward as councillor. Councillors are elected and paid to make decisions. Councillors are obligated under 28(1)(a) and (b) of the LG Act to participate in Council's decision making in the best interests of the community and obliged under 28(2)(b) to act in accordance with the standards of conduct.

No matter what decisions need to be made I will not abandon my duty and will not cut and run.

Daylesford tragedy November 2023 – Given the legal nature of the outcome of the very recent committal hearing I will only comment that my thoughts are with the families and friends of the victims; with first responders and community members who assisted in the awful aftermath; and with the broader Shire community. As we approach the first anniversary Council is working with the families and various experts to determine a respectful and sensitive way in which to mark the occasion. Announcements will follow in due course.

Mayoral duties – in the report I delivered to the September meeting I reflected on some key aspects of the 4-year term and looked to the future, noting that the past month has of course been dominated by two Special Meetings and the extensive community consultation that led up to them. In a major step forward the unanimous adoption of the five town structure plans and rural strategy sets the scene for a significant body of work to be undertaken in conjunction with the community. That work, along with realigning Council's strategic direction and priorities to its constrained financial capacity, should be Council's highest priorities for some time.

The annual report was also adopted at this meeting and is available on Council's website. I encourage you to have a look in the rearview mirror for a full breakdown of the shire's major events and achievements in 2024. But for me the highlights of 23/24 include the advancement of the ambitious and critically important Future Hepburn program; completing or advancing major capital projects such as the Mechanics Trentham, Central Springs Reserve and Creswick Trails (Djuwang Baring). The gold Victorian award and silver national awards for tourism in Daylesford are also standouts.

Of course it would also be timely to quickly glance back at the past 4 years as this term comes to an end. There have been three major themes – Council's response to emergencies such as the numerous floods and June 2021 storm; addressing a myriad of legacy issues; and an ambitious and expansive capital works program.

Councillor's Report

In my view Council's handling of the COVID pandemic and the various severe weather events was exemplary. The appropriate support was extended to the community on all occasions. Similarly the tragic incident in Daylesford almost a year ago was sensitively handled.

The reality was that this councillor group had no choice other than to tackle a number of inherited legacy issues. The aforementioned neglect of planning regulations was embraced through the Future Hepburn program. A suite of policies and strategies too many to mention were created in conjunction with officers. And of course the albatross at 47-51 Vincent St was finally let loose.

We embarked on an ambitious capital works program – some of our own doing, some inherited but needing completion. By my reckoning the capex program over the past 4 years exceeded \$50m, funded by \$21m in grants and \$29m in Council funds. And that doesn't include the \$15m in storm and flood recovery works. (Council received only \$11.7m in disaster relief funding).

Having taken that glimpse in the rear-view mirror I finish this report with what I see through the windscreen. The fast-approaching \$4m pa cash shortfall screams out for a change in direction. A strategic realignment is required, taking Council's direction back into the mainstream core functions and thereby living within our means. Priority setting will be key. Council cannot speed past the sign-posts disclosing deficits of \$20m over the past 4 years. A dab on the brakes would be wise too. The new councillor group certainly has a monumental task.

Council elections – The Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) will conduct elections for all 79 Councils across Victoria on October 26 2024. Voting papers will be sent to residents from October 7 and voting is by mail.

Information on voting, the changed electoral structure for Hepburn Shire, candidacy and other matters is available on Council's website here [Local Government election Hepburn Shire Council](#) and the VEC website. Councillors still retain their normal role until October 25 but no meetings will be held and no major decisions can be made during that period.

At the conclusion of nominations 12 people are standing as candidates for the 7 councillor positions. Four sitting councillors, including myself, are seeking re-election.

When commenting on the new unsubdivided model for Hepburn Shire I expressed concerns that the smaller population centres may not be represented as over 60% of the Shire's population reside in Daylesford and Creswick. Those fears remain – 9 of the 12 candidates are from Daylesford and Creswick.

More information on the election will follow.

Climate Change again...

Well, we are the sustainability group.



What is the difference between climate and weather? Weather refers to short-term atmospheric conditions, while climate is the weather of a specific region averaged over a long period of time. I understand that the long period of time used by climate scientists is 30 years. Climate (despite being complex) changes much more slowly than weather so it is much easier to predict.

In Australia we are already experiencing higher temperatures, more extreme droughts, fire seasons (we must take heed) and floods. Australia's average temperature has increased on average by 1.47 ± 0.24 °C since national records began in 1910. The 2015 Paris Climate Agreement's central aim is to pursue efforts to limit the temperature increase globally to 1.5 degrees.

With very high confidence, the CSIRO and BOM project that hot days will become more frequent and hotter, sea levels will rise, oceans will become more acidic and snow depths will decline. Do you think we are already seeing less snow here? With high confidence, both institutions project that extreme rainfall events will become more intense. Do you think our winters are as cold as they used to be? Extreme weather events like bushfires, floods and coral

Thank you to the volunteers who gave their time and energy. Gravel was spread around the new garden edges, a very cold job given that it snowed later in the day. The BBQ kitchen area was cleaned out, floors in the station were washed and fridges moved. The weatherboard walls were washed down inside ready for painting. The Trentham Garden

Putting your Stamp on a Garden

To me the most beautiful gardens are those infused with the personalities of the owners. Often, there are layers put into place by the previous owners too, and developing the garden becomes a kind of elaboration on existing patterns and themes. How do you make a garden your own?

A garden definitely doesn't stand still, so change always needs to be embraced and this will often prompt alternations in style. Plants become old and need replacing, light levels change due to growing trees etc and lifestyle patterns alter over the generations.

Where possible, it's good to use existing features, but often we need to make big decisions to properly update the garden. The building of large new features will prompt these changes and they need to be done confidently in order to be successful; using a garden designer can come in handy in these cases. A garden usually benefits from a strong concept rather than just being the result of haphazard decisions made in the moment.

Sometimes the changes are smaller and are more questions of taste. Again, confidence is key here. For example, changing a white and blue scheme by adding yellow could work brilliantly, but the yellow would probably work best repeated throughout the garden bed to reinforce the effect and make it look purposeful.

Due to the busier lifestyles and smaller gardens of the last couple of decades, the nursery industry has responded by selecting and developing cultivars which stay compact and perform well with minimal additional pruning and maintenance. Much of the unnecessary work in older gardens is due to inappropriate planting - so updating and refining the plant selection can do a lot to reduce your gardening workload!



There is so much about garden design which is personal preference; colour, style, amount of privacy required etc. There is certainly logic in waiting until you have settled into a new house before updating the garden, but don't forget that a garden takes time to grow, so get started on tailoring your garden to you and your family.

Uniting Church Again Rejects Affordable Housing

The former St Andrew's church site on the Market and Camp Street corner remains empty. Why not have it used for affordable housing?

That's what we proposed to Uniting Church authorities back in May... but Uniting Housing insists there is no demand for affordable housing in Trentham.

This is a peculiar view from a 'caring' institution in the middle of a national housing crisis, a political impasse on action and the release of a report that shows housing affordability in Victoria has dropped to its worst on record.*

Meanwhile Uniting Housing passes the buck to Uniting Property, which just wants the money – selling an asset that morally belongs to this community!

Maybe a handful of units in Trentham won't do much for the national crisis, so why does Trentham need more affordable housing?

A mix of housing options is needed for workers in aged care, child care and hospitality all of which are a direct benefit to our town. There is also a humanitarian need to respond to long-term housing insecurity experienced by many people, especially older women.

If any of this makes you angry when we could be doing something to help – it should (we are!). If you've got any ideas or know any philanthropists, please contact us.

The miserable offer of a 10% discount off market value by the Uniting Property doesn't allow for a viable affordable housing project but we have explored this option. We are reluctant to pursue this 'offer' given Trentham's claim on the property but want to engage the community in determining the fate of this property – the last uncommitted 'community space' in the central township.

- The purpose of Trentham Community Action is to work to build a stronger and more resilient future for the town and district through active representation, advocacy and collaboration.

Membership will be open to all citizens resident in Trentham and district along with community groups.

Proposed operating model – the key elements are:

- informed and active member participation – operationally a flat structure with project teams as needed where all members can participate;
- all members able to vote on priorities and recommended action.

Basic principles according to the purposes of the group:

- addressing community needs/issues not otherwise covered;
- not duplicate any other group;
- the whole greater than the sum of the parts;
- taking responsibility for our future – the subsidiarity principle.

A volunteer committee was formed to instigate the process for Incorporation, set up bank account, insurance, and accept membership. This committee comprises, John Brereton, Jennifer Collins, Fay Magee, John Osborne, Kaz Williams, and possibly one other to be confirmed. The next community meeting will formalise these matters and elect an ongoing committee.

There is still much to unpack but there is optimism that this is a good step forward!

Many former staff and Trentham locals attended the exhibition on Saturday and the room was filled with cherished memories of time spent at the health service and of people past and present. The exhibition featured old medical instruments, an antique wheelchair, books, articles and reports as well as many photo albums.

A highlight at the event was the interview records with former staff and volunteers Mary Walsh, Kath Morrison, Cath O'Connell, Kit Manning, Joy Justice and current Director of Nursing Tracey Michalczak along with a documentary on Dr Gwen Wisewould provided by Her Place Women's Museum and a Walsh family video of her funeral.

The three-course dinner hosted by CHRH Board Chair, The Hon. Mary Delahunty, featured guest speakers The Hon. Mary-Anne Thomas MP and Mayor Brian Hood (*above right*) who reflected on the history and future of Trentham Health. All in the Timing

Calendar wise, the season is Spring and perhaps our assumptions are sunshine and warmth. I think the few luscious days in August duped us into thinking Winter had passed. The vagaries of the weather are just that.

However, there is some pressure as a garden lover to not get caught leaving our Spring plantings too late in the season. The ground is ripe for many native species, with soil saturated from the constancy of wonderful rains. Although we may continue to have low overnight temperatures, I'm hopeful the worst of the frosts and ice / snow like Saturday 14/9, will be behind us. Of course, I may be wrong and my current enthusiasm for planting out the south side of our front dam may backfire!

My last contribution spoke of planting the back of our property to hopefully provide a corridor to connect with our neighbour's remnant forest. This in its' maturity and my enthusiasm, would provide shelter and food for all native critters great and small. I left the planting until late Spring, needed to water through the summer with the tanker and have now counted the loss of tender young plants and trees to this years' severe frosts. All were healthy tube- stock, most have survived, not entirely thrived and a good 10 out of the 70 need replacing. I guess that's not too bad overall.

While I replace many of the protectors for a newer sturdy style and replace the lost plants/trees, I have started on

Trentham Bowling Club

Our History So Far

Starting with a public meeting in January 1962, Trentham folk showed a keen interest in forming a bowling club.

Councillor J.G. Rothe chaired the meeting and Dr O'Loughlin, a Gisborne doctor, spoke of the benefits such a club would provide to the town.

Moving quickly, a committee was formed with Jim Hutcheson as President and Jim Fairless as Secretary. Negotiations took place to lease land which was part of the Trentham Park and Recreation Reserve. With a lease agreement secured, work began on creating the green. This is the land our club still resides on. Earth moving machinery was borrowed to level the land. Loans and donations enabled the purchase of materials to create the green as well as landscaping the surrounding area.

On the 3 November 1963 Councillor A.J. McCarthy, Shire President, officially opened the Trentham Bowling Club. Straight after the official opening, the first competition bowls rolled down the new green.

The first clubhouse was a machinery shed till 1965, when Clive Robson and his sons planned and built the Clubhouse. By 2003 the original grass green was in need of replacement. Club members worked to gain sponsorship money as well as funding from the State government and Hepburn Shire Council who carried out the works.

The original green was cut up into strips, rolled up and taken to Gisborne Golf Club where it was put to further use. The new green at Trentham Bowling Club was ready for the opening of the 2004-2005 season.

Trentham Dance is Back!

There has been dancing in the Trentham Mechanics ever since it was built in 1881. John Cook ran the monthly dance for 27 years before he left town a few years ago. That incarnation of the dance was supported by the Historical Society and the Lions Club, working away in the kitchen while the dancers enjoyed the music of Family Rhythm in the hall. It was interrupted by COVID and the closure of the hall during renovations.

The new Trentham dance is the same as before – but different! The first one was held on Sunday 8 September, organised by a group of local dancers, and drawing 98 people to enjoy Rod McKenzie's wonderful music. The larger hall allowed a wider variety of dances and the tech facilities allowed an electronic display for the programme. However, the friendly atmosphere and the vast country spread for afternoon tea was just like old times, and we are looking forward to the next occasion – **Sunday 13 October at 1.30 pm** with Philip Brown providing the music.

We'd love to see more local faces- both on the dance floor and in the Working Group. Perhaps there is an appetite for learning a dance or remembering what you once knew, maybe even a local person willing to teach? At the start of a new venture it doesn't hurt to let the imagination fly...

Food for Thought

Eating 30 plants a week

We know that we should have 5 serves of fruit and vegetables a day. But now according to some scientists and the health industry the aim is 30 plants a week. (Although that's 5 less than before, let's not split peas over that!)

It has come about over the past couple of years, based on research by the American Gut Project and Professor Spector of King's College London, one of Britain's leading gut health experts. The project looked at the diets of 11,000 participants, and found those who ate 30 different plants per week is decreasing the risk of illness and improving brain function, nutrient status and good gut health.

Parkinson's disease Australian researchers hope to slow or stop the progression of the disease by targeting the gut rather than the brain. Queensland University of Technology has been awarded \$4 million for the four-year trial that will look at combating the illness by altering gut health.

Well what to eat? Some vegetables were always considered to be boiled and over boiled in a lot of cases. Try cauliflower or broccoli cut into florets sprinkled with a little black pepper and a splash of olive oil and oven roasted. Or brussels sprouts tossed in a fry pan with a knob of butter and a little garlic.

Baby carrots and or turnips tossed in a little melted butter and a pinch of sugar before roasting. Locally grown asparagus is in abundance, just snap off the woody ends

"No, but we do have some lovely Kiwi green chicken curry and some Canadian cannelloni." Seeing a familiar confused look fall upon Digby's face the very patient Todd went on to explain "Of course, I'm referring to the cooks rather than the origin of the meals".

"Ok I'll take one of each and some wine, some of that excellent organic stuff you have from Tellurian in Heathcote, preferably white"

"Ok, Vermentino? Fiano? Maybe a Rosé?"

"Yes, all of those thanks mate."

and toss it onto the BBQ or grill or fry pan with a little oil.

Baked beans are a source protein and fibre as are other tinned beans and chickpeas. Although I prefer the dry chick peas and beans soaked overnight in cold water drained followed by boiling in plenty of cold water and when tender make a simple dip with a little tahini paste, lemon juice, olive oil, salt and pepper and maybe add in a few left over roasted carrots or some freshly boiled beetroot for great dip. Freeze the rest and they become as convenient as frozen peas. Other convenient frozen vegetables are sweetcorn kernels and blocks of spinach.

Thyme, Rosemary, sage, bay leaves, parsley stalks and coriander root are all great to cook with and there is nothing nicer than to add a few herbs to finish off a dish - and they are all easy to grow even in a pot.

In February 2023 In England there was a shortage of some vegetables. The then Environment Secretary Therese Coffey in an almost Marie Antoinette way said "Let them eat turnips". A couple of days later you couldn't buy a turnip for love or money!

This week I have eaten 28 plants until today! I hope to add 3 more plants to the weekly intake when I do some more research to see if they can be taken in a liquid form: grapes, barley and hops!
