Some of the objectives of the new plan include investigation and implementation of a cat curfew, development of an off-lead dog park masterplan, easier reporting of dog attacks, and increased community

🔊 🔛 PROJECT UPDATES

Construction of the pavilion at the Trentham Sportsground Reserve is progressing, with roofing works and internal wall framing now complete. Next steps include external cladding, internal services rough-in and the veranda construction. The pavilion is on track to open in November

Works at the Trentham Community Hub are also progressing. Engineers have advised that some of the framing of the Mechanics Hall needs to be replaced. Those sections will be rebuilt to the same specifications as the original structure. A planning permit amendment is not required. Works will continue on construction of this important community building, which will deliver a library, visitor information centre, council customer service counter, meeting rooms, and a multi-functional community hall. Trentham Town Survey

Our Town, Our Future.

We continue to analyse your detailed and thoughtful feedback and are pleased to share a brief synopsis to provide a sense of what we've found for questions 1 and 2. The remaining questions will follow in the next edition (October), and later we will provide more detailed qualitative analysis for longer reading.

Our first question in the Trentham survey was, What do you like about living in Trentham?

One hundred and seventy nine people responded, writing over 4,700 words. Their response was clear: community was mentioned 86 times, followed by small (referring to small town and small population) 63 times, and then rural or country feel (57 times). The community was described as friendly, active, supportive, tight knit, small, caring, thoughtful and strong, along with appreciation of the community spirit, community feel and sense of community.

After these, the most commonly used words were tree (43), friendly and people (37 and 38 respectively), historic/old or heritage (32), nature or natural (32), environment (27) and beauty/beautiful (22).

In the next tranche of responses, the key words included peace, space, quiet, walking, air and open-ness.

There was a remarkable unanimity amongst the respondents, mostly tied to the community, smallness, rural feel, and friendliness. People wrote about walking in a peaceful, quiet atmosphere and meeting people they liked. Trentham's small size, harmony with nature and rural feel were critical. Proximity to the forest and appreciation of

Trentham's shops and facilities were highly considered, as was proximity to other towns and Melbourne itself.

Many also wrote of the need they felt to protect Trentham's unique character, its community and small, rural feel.

Question two asked, What do you like about Trentham's appearance? One hundred and seventy four people responded, writing over 3,330 words.

It was clear that people really like Trentham's appearance, and the respondents expressed a strong love for their town. The most strongly liked aspect of Trentham's appearance was its historic nature; the words 'historic/al', 'old', 'traditional' and 'heritage' were used 118 times in total, and they were used in reference to Trentham's streetscapes, its buildings (shops and houses) and general character.

Trentham's trees and gardens were mentioned 75 timestrees (4) on both public and private land and gardens (28). The town's open, natural spaces were also appreciated, with the word 'space' (as in open space, sense of space, public space and green space), along with 'parks' and 'reserves' mentioned in total 49 times. Possibly allied with this, but given here separately, were the words 'country' and 'rural', mentioned 37 times.

There were also many appreciative mentions of the main (or high) street and its shops (45 in total).

The overall sentiment was that the respondents loved the appearance of their town and wanted to write about it: it mattered to them. They particularly liked its historic appearance, along with its trees, open space, reserves and gardens, its shops and rural nature.

14 Years of a Good Way to Start the Week

Cr Heather Mutimer's initiative to introduce weekly peace-meditation at Daylesford Town Hall inspired me to introduce meditation at the Trentham Neighbourhood Centre. Partly to avoid the drive, partly to introduce a contemporary form of meditation based on centuries old Western traditions without the support of recorded music and incense.

So, I brought a simple folding table, covered with a cloth with the ceiling pattern of a Buddhist temple near Kyoto and a brass candleholder in the shape of a swan, symbol of peace. Memories of a visit to Kyoto, plus some of the vases from Kyoto in the TNC cupboard.

The format of the session is simple: a candle and some flowers in the centre, we sit on chairs, we begin with some movements, to be 'at home in the body', 'pre-yoga'. Then a text is read which introduces the meditation, after which we meditate in our own individual way.

We converse and focus on a particular issue, where we will send our thoughts of peace. To close we stand in a circle and move with gestures that evoke the 'tree of life' and then the gesture of sending our thoughts of peace into the world; and blow the light of the candle - symbolically - in the direction of the chosen issue.

At first, I stayed close to the text given by our teacher Gideon, later I developed the text in different ways, deepening our own meditative awareness and widening our attention to what happens in the world.

Membership slowly changed over the years, but there has always been a core-group that carried the meditation on, also in times that I was ill or away.

I am grateful for all the encouragement, contributions, and friendship! This includes TNC staff always helpful in accommodating the meditation during internal changes.



We celebrated 14 years with an open fire and followed the meditation with a cuppa, scones and a video of spiritual teacher Shin Gwydion's seminar in Trentham, 2006.

Over the years we have always found this a good way to start the week. And so we go on. Newcomers are welcome.

Energy Feasibility Study - Report to the Community

TSG's third community information session for the Energy & Climate Resilient Trentham project featured project consultants, Middleton Group, presenting the main results from the feasibility report. You can find the 4 August presentation and the full report (when finalised) on the TSG website: trenthamsustainabilitygroup.com

Now the exciting work of bolstering the energy supply of the whole town begins!

The report found that while a whole-town microgrid was technically feasible (diagram below), it would require formidable capital investment to achieve the 5.5 gigawatthours of local energy supply and appropriately-scaled battery storage required for back-up.




The consultants made several recommendations that can help us secure our energy supply on our own terms:

Most exciting of their suggestions is to attack the issue by drawing a zone around the houses serviced by particular power transformers in town, starting with the transformer on the corner of Market and High Streets. This single transformer supplies 14% of the town with electricity and supplies some of the most important facilities in the case of a power outage or natural disaster, including the CFA, the new community centre site, the supermarket, and the Neighbourhood Centre. By installing a large battery and generator near this transformer we could ensure that the power can stay on at these sites for some hours (or longer with a back-up generator) while the rest of the grid is down.

In addition, the more solar and batteries installed at individual premises in this zone, the longer the power can stay on. This forms the second recommendation: that we continue the growth of solar and battery storage. Solar currently provides 14.3% of Trentham's total energy supply. Growth in solar production is happening faster than the growth of energy use – if this continues we might be able to achieve something like 50-75% of the energy consumed in Trentham produced right here in town - just from solar!

The report also recommends an energy retailer which might partner with Trentham Sustainability Group and Cool Country Community Enterprises (CCCE) to create a special local energy offer to get the best value and drive local energy projects through a local projects fund and effective management of local energy resources.

Why a Community Battery?



TSG will be working with CCCE to discuss next steps, before approaching Powercor and energy retailers, preparing funding applications for a neighbourhood battery, generator and further solar in the Market Street transformer zone. Watch out in coming months for promotions from TSG and our associates for quality, cost-effective options for solar and battery installation at your home.

Bendigo Bank was one of the first banks to offer green loans in Australia in 2002, as part of our commitment to sustainability and being carbon neutral.

Our branch manager for the last 3.5 years Joel Condon, has done such a great job that he's been offered a promotion. The branch team, Board, and community wish him well in his new role and we're



excited about welcoming a new team leader soon.

Interior Design

Moving the Furniture

I like to encourage my clients to collect images they like from Instagram, Pinterest, magazines, and design books. A collection of images is the best way to communicate your likes and dislikes.

Preparing a floorplan helps map how you move through rooms and where furniture can be placed. You will then be ready to think about any additional furnishings you may need and consider where and how to place family pieces you may have inherited.

Large inherited furniture items can pose a dilemma if very different to other pieces. Use your imagination: wooden chairs and tables can be sanded and painted; sofas and armchairs can be reupholstered or refreshed with new cushions. A large modern artwork can look fantastic above a period sofa, providing a new perspective.

Furniture should have some similarity or connectivity, so that there is a degree of continuity as you move through your home. Items of similar sizes, colours, textures, shapes, periods, or styles will provide cohesion. Take care though, as too much careful matching can look contrived and bland. Unexpected combinations of fabrics and textures achieve an enhanced result.

Bear in mind the likely changes to the use of a room over time. A bedroom for a baby has different requirements to that for a young child; that baby may be a young child by the time a bedroom renovation is completed.

A separate dining room is often a space that is rarely used in day-to-day life. Consider expanding the dining table to provide a work surface for your home office. All you need is an angled desk light, and some storage to hide away the printer, computer and other office needs when not in use.

Instead of a coordinated dining suite of table, carvers and chairs, another option is a collection of assorted chairs painted and upholstered in a complementary and cohesive manner. Spare dining chairs can be useful scattered throughout the house in different rooms and can be quickly gathered together at the dining table when needed. Nanna's dining furniture reimagined!

It's understandable when moving home to want to replace older furniture, but there is no need to replace everything.



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A client moved into a recently built townhouse: the ground floor is a generous open plan communal space with large wooden window frames painted black, polished parquetry flooring, and expansive white walls. After deciding how to lay out the room, we looked at what pieces of existing furniture could be used.

As the room had a very neutral colour palette with plenty of natural light, we agreed more colour and substance were needed. A large red and blue oriental rug inherited from her mother had always looked out of place in the client's former home. In the new house, we rolled this rug out on the floor and used it as inspiration to select and place furniture. We took the rug's rich red and navy tones as our starting colour palette.

We ordered a pair of large brick-red textured deep sofas to sit opposite each other and a pair of dark blue leather swivel chairs. An existing square coffee table and sofa table completed the main furnishings of the room. A warm mix of old and new items from different styles created a complete and comfortable space.

Next month I will be writing about key styling tips in the lead up to conducting design masterclasses later this year.

The Trentham Garden

The Problem with Poultry

The bane of my existence at the moment are the three Chinese geese that maraud around our garden. It's true that they are beautiful, but the amount of destruction they cause, their tendency to poo on the front doorstep and lunge at guests means that I'm keen to see the back of them. Did you ever notice that the horrible things have serrated bills? AND TONGUES?!!!

To be fair, it's our fault for getting them without having an appropriate way to keep them contained during the day. Even still... I just ordered a couple of tins of 'confit goose' legs to cook a lovely gourmet dinner for my partner (together with a serious message about the fates of these horrible birds).

My experience as a designer is that outbuildings for keeping poultry etc. can be beautiful features in gardens if designed well using nice materials. There's two main ways of keeping backyard poultry; construct a small building with a large run for them to scratch around in or commit to letting them in and out of the garden every day. Make sure to use sturdy wire mesh to construct the cage and create a 'skirt' under the ground to prevent foxes digging under.

I find that I can tolerate bantam-sized chickens digging around the garden, but the larger breeds cause too much destruction for me. The fluffy-footed breeds cause less damage, but I don't like how their feet get all dirty and muddy (as happens often in Trentham!)

Poultry are one of the elements that bring a garden to life; they can be extremely useful in providing food and manure in exchange for garden waste and kitchen scraps. However, think carefully about how you want to keep them... your garden should be a joy to be in!

Trentham Gardens for Wildlife

Spring!

With lots of optimism about warmer weather, thoughts are turning to planting again, along with the weeding!



Hepburn Gardens for Wildlife is here to help if you are thinking about adding a space in your garden for local native plants. Our program provides a free consultation with a visit from two trained mentors. They will start from where you are at with your garden, whatever that may be. When you register (through TNC) you can provide a brief summary of your vision, what you hope to achieve.

The mentors will assess the features you already have in terms of food and shelter for our local wildlife. And of course, wildlife starts with the smallest insects which are

so important for the ecosystem. Birds, bees, and butterflies make good use of a wide range of locally available plants, from ground covers,

grasses, small shrubs, to the medium sized and, if appropriate, some of our grand eucalypts.

Different parts of your property may require different plantings- wetter areas, maybe even with a pond, under existing trees or shrubs can be value-added for greater diversity, to open areas ready for new ideas. You may be interested in planting on the nature strip - there are new and encouraging guidelines from Hepburn Shire Council.

After the visit, the mentors will prepare a report which will work from your vision. This report will be given to you as soon as possible and will include lists of most suitable plants. When you request a visit, you will receive a free copy of the comprehensive guide to local native plants and habitat, "Grow Wild" by Jill Teschendorff. This book includes details of local soil types, guidelines for planting and maintaining your native garden, and photos and descriptions of 74 plants making for a good start!

There are also places where you can see what others have planted near where you live. Our HG4W group is planning to arrange visits in the next few months and workshops to help grow local knowledge of the wonders of the biodiversity of our region. Meanwhile, look out for information regarding an event to be hosted by Hepburn Shire Council in Quarry Street Reserve on Saturday 17 September.



Trentham Quarry Street Reserve

Big News #1: Council has approved funding for the renovation/upgrade for the Pavilion and Toilets at the Reserve and has appointed a contractor. This is the result of *years* of dreaming, planning, and negotiating, with many people involved in the community and at our local Council.

Burnbrook Fields - Spring Recipe

Councillor's Report

September 2022

Major infrastructure projects - I am very pleased to report that a construction contract was awarded for an extensive upgrade of the Quarry Street Reserve pavilion and toilets. Challenges in the construction industry have delayed this important project but work will soon be underway. The total project value is \$519k. This is another major step forward for Trentham's facilities. Well done to the Reserve Committee of Management for their work with Council to advance this project.

Work on the sportsground buildings continues to press ahead despite unfavourable weather conditions and is still on track for a late October completion. The new facilities will be of enormous benefit to the football, netball, and cricket clubs – and their members of all ages – as well as the general public.

Similarly, work is proceeding on the community centre construction notwithstanding lots of rain and mud! Unsurprisingly for a building of its age, significant weaknesses were found in the structure and are being addressed to ensure safety and to build a long-lasting community facility. A time-lapse camera has been installed so that a video of the year's work will be preserved for posterity. The project remains on-track for a mid-2023 completion.

Council budget 2022/23 – the budget was adopted at the June Council meeting along with the asset plan. The precarious cash outlook necessitates a thorough review in the next few months. The projections disclose a massive reliance on securing grant funding to fund the ambitious capital works program. The state government has ranked Hepburn Shire in the bottom ten of Victoria's 79 councils on long term financial viability. Significant steps must be taken to improve the outlook if Hepburn Shire Council is to satisfy the community's needs and expectations.

Councillors and senior management are conducting a strategic workshop in late August in part to assess the current situation, identify priorities and agree on the implementation of corrective measures.

Rex – last month I undertook to provide an update on the Rex project after my return from a mid-winter break. This is a contentious project with significant implications for Council's finances. It directly affects accommodation for Council staff, community space, the Daylesford library, and the former cinema – all matters that now require much better strategic planning than what has occurred. There isn't space in this report to fully cover the whole sorry saga so (a) I am happy to discuss it with anyone who contacts me and (b) will publish here the twelve points I made at the July meeting when the decision was taken to sell the building.

"Councillors - I will keep my comments brief for three reasons - much has already been said; the allocation of 3 minutes couldn't possibly do justice to this fiasco; and this organisation chooses to not capture the key points of debate in the minutes of its meetings, so it all feels rather pointless saying much.

I make the following 12 observations.

Based on the 2014 community consultation the building should never have been purchased in the first place. (The community wanted the Hepburn Hub to be in Daylesford town hall).

The acquisition and its price tag of \$6.345m are both highly questionable.

The Municipal Inspectorate's delay in releasing its report is extremely unhelpful as it denies transparency and it fails on justice and accountability.

The lack of control and planning exercised by some previous councillors and previous management has rendered the expenditure of a further \$3m of ratepayers' funds wasteful.

The current group of councillors and management have done the responsible thing and halted the project and closely examined all options.

All of this is occurring in an organisation that has twice ran out of unrestricted cash in the past 18 months; has a precarious financial outlook; has no plan for the maintenance and renewal of community buildings worth \$135m, some of which are heritage listed; until recently had no workforce strategy (although it employs 210 people); is struggling to recover from the financial and human impact of COVID and two devastating weather events; and has a backlog of planning applications that an Olympian couldn't pole vault over. There are many pressing issues that management and councillors must address.

The need for the intended purposes of the Hepburn Hub is not in question. Better staff accommodation is needed. A bigger and better library and community spaces are needed. The resolution to assist in finding a home for the cinema must be carried out... and that includes recognition that a partially completed facility already exists within the building.

Although the various needs are clearly apparent the dominating factor continues to be the eye-watering cost (between an additional \$10m and \$18m depending on configuration) and risk associated with Council retaining ownership of the building.

Consultation on the intention to sell has been carried out in accordance with the LG Act. However, it is highly regrettable that communication over the past 7 months has been ineffective and in places misguided and uninformed. Time and energy have been wasted.

The 98% and 97% statistics arising from the recent survey send a clear compelling message that should be heeded. (98% of the community did not ask for the building to be retained in Council ownership and 97% of the community didn't think the subject important enough to warrant completing the survey).

In the context of councillors being legally obliged to make responsible, evidence-based decisions in the best interests of the whole shire community it would be reckless, unaffordable, and risky for Council to retain ownership of the building.

I therefore support the officers' recommendation to sell the Rex."

Council will now proceed with the sale. Contrary to some assertions councillors do retain control over the sale process as the resolution requires a report be presented to councillors before any further action is taken.

Upcoming Council meeting dates – 20 September, 18 October, 22 November. A special meeting will be held on 15 November to elect the Mayor and Deputy Mayor for the coming year.

Trentham Tales

The Settlement

Over the years the Trentham district has seen several waves of settlers.

After the explorers of the 1830s came the gold rush of the 1850-60s, a period that lured thousands of arrivals from all parts of the world. It was the next wave of settlers over the following 30 years that cleared the land, established farms and created a merchant class necessary to support a growing population.

All this development led to the great boom of the 1880s but, as with most booms, it was followed by a bust and then the Depression of the 1890s.

To alleviate the growing number of impoverished and unemployed in inner city slums during this time - read Carlton, Collingwood, Richmond, Fitzroy, Flemington, and the North and West Melbourne and Kensington areas known as Dudley Flats - the government introduced the Village Settlement Act of 1892.

Sites in Bullarto, Lyonville and North Blackwood were among those selected. The original proposal for the North Blackwood site was promoted by Mr J. Affleck Robertson who had some rather big ideas.

He envisaged a site, of initially 400 acres at the southern end of James Lane, along each side of Amblers Lane and down to Bowdens Road. It was to be divided into 400 village blocks and each settler was to be allocated 10 to 15 acres to work on a semi-communal basis.

Settlers would be supplied with the basics for farming: a horse and plough or equipment for tree felling. Settlers could be advanced cash for their labour on communal projects to help establish themselves.

And, provided they were up-to-date with rent and showed improvements they could be granted a lease which could be converted to freehold.

All sounds good?

Well, not much went to plan. Firstly, those who were chosen to become a 'Settler' were ill-equipped, with no experience of rural life and often no desire to cope with the extremely difficult conditions.

Secondly, there was discontent with the allocation of land made through a ballot system.

Then relations with Mr Robertson very quickly deteriorated. What was a money-making exercise for him was a fight for survival for the Settlers.

Access to the North Blackwood Settlement Village was impossible for many months of the year because of the heavy mud tracks, making supplies hard to source.

Violence broke out among the settlers and visits from the police generated official reports to the government with, perhaps, the first accusations in the district of vandalism



over the indiscriminate felling of trees being made!

The original project anticipated settling 1200 people but only about 70 eventually settled on plots.

With no farming experience, difficult cultivating conditions due to the heavy soil and poor equipment, and social isolation, there was little prospect of a successful future. Some plots changed hands, but many were just abandoned, resulting in more disquiet amongst the community.

However, one of the success stories of this sad experiment was the Ambler family who were the only settlers to remain in the district. The Amblers went on to purchase extra plots, increasing their holding and turning their land into a viable farm - located, naturally, around Amblers Lane.

A certain stigma hung over the Settlement well into the 1960s and it was considered a place best avoided.

However, Tom Walsh along with others who have memories of the Settlement and its characters, believed those who were attracted to the area through this scheme added colour to the district and considered it an interesting interlude in our history.

More information, including some quaint and humorous stories about the North Blackwood Settlement and a more successful one in Bullarto, is available in The Trentham & District Historical Society archives to which Ina Bertrand and David Endacott (dec) have made valuable contributions.






