Tribute from Trentham District Cricket Club

Bill O'Connell was a long-time Life Member, legend, and co-founder of the modern-day Trentham District Cricket Club. His name is deservedly synonymous with the Club, which he actively supported for more than six decades.

From the early 1960s, Bill devoted a huge amount of time and energy to the game and to the Club. He was a great player, captain, president, and coach. He usually performed multiple roles concurrently, and it was largely through his efforts that the Club has survived and prospered, including through periods that were challenging due to shortages of players.

Our present-day members missed seeing Bill in his playing days. However, it is clear from his record that he was an excellent batsman, winning numerous Club and Association batting average awards. From all reports, he was a hard man to dismiss and very strong square of the wicket, so you bowled short at your peril! He was also a very handy bowler and did get a hat-trick and one sixwicket haul.

In a lifetime full of great cricketing achievements and highlights, the following are amongst his best:

- Bill scored 19 centuries including one in representative cricket;
- In Season 1972/73, he had a batting aggregate of 659 runs at the extraordinary average of 131.2 runs per innings (a Club record that may never be beaten);
- He captained the 1962/63 premiership team;
- He was Club president and/or secretary for most of the period from the 1960s to the 1990s;
- He was made a Life Member of the Trentham District Cricket Club in Season 1980/81;
- He was made Life Member of the Daylesford Cricket Association in 1982 (He was Association president from 1975 to 1984);
- He won the Shire of Kyneton Sports Award in 1985;
- He coached junior cricketers for about 30 years, a few of whom still play for the Club.

Despite all his achievements, Bill was always humble, and focused more on the Club and helping other players. In honour of Bill's achievements and service, the Trentham and Blackwood Clubs compete each year for the Bill O'Connell Shield, a tradition going back to 1994. In addition, since 2014, the season's Best Player award for the Trentham Club has been named after him.

Even in later years and, despite failing health, Bill maintained a strong passion and interest in the Club. It is quite possible that Bill attended every one of the presentations since the early 1960s (or, if not, very close to it), including last season's presentation. It has always



been a great privilege to have him personally present the Bill O'Connell Award for Best Player, and he will be a sad absence from now on.

Bill O'Connell was a great bloke to know. He had plenty of time for everyone and was always up for a good chat. Many of our Club members over the last twenty years have enjoyed long conversations with him, mostly of course about cricket and football, in both of which he demonstrated an excellent recall and breadth of knowledge.

Bill leaves an extraordinary legacy and cannot be thanked enough for his services to the Trentham District Cricket Club. He is truly a legend in the eyes of the Club and will be sadly missed.

The Club sends its heartfelt condolences to Cath O'Connell and Family.

Well batted, Billy.

Vale Bill O'Connell

A long-time supporter of the Kyneton Marist Brothers Old Boys Bill O'Connell of East Trentham died on the 15th of November 2025 in his eighty-seventh year.

Bill was one of the many Trentham boys who attended the school at Kyneton. After finishing school he returned to the family farm and continued his selected occupation.

His wife Cath was always at his side when the Old Boys held their annual reunion and general meetings. Bill was unwell and unable to attend the 2025 reunion in January, but was treated to a take home meal organised by Cath.

The Trentham Football Netball Club called Bill a true "Sainter" due to his commitment to the Club for most of his adult life. Quote: - A gifted footballer, a cricketing great, and a legendary bowler, Bill's passion for sport was matched only by his unwavering commitment to the next generation. His selflessness, humility, and quiet leadership left an indelible mark on all who knew him.-: unquote.

The Brothers instilled the Catholic faith in students. In keeping with the Old Boys credo Servabo Fidem, Bill O'Connell certainly carried the lessons into life and was able to serve the faith until his death.

In 2002 when the Sacred Heart Church at East Trentham was stripped and sold. Bill, as secretary of the church community took on the Parish Priest and the Archbishop. Sadly it was to no avail and the artefacts were scattered via auction and other means. Many people would have become "Lapsed Catholic" but not Bill. The Church was built in 1890 with money from local farmers, the descendants of Irish migrants who settled the area in the 1840s.

A funeral mass for the repose of the soul for Mr William Joseph 'Bill' O'Connell was offered at St. Mary Magdalen's Catholic Church, Trentham by Father Declan O'Brien on Monday 24 November. A burial followed at Tylden Cemetery.

The Church and Graveyard, as well as the Pig and Whistle hotel where a wake was held were overcrowded. The funeral cortege diverted via Pearsons Road East Trentham past Bill and Cath's home.

Son, Daniel gave the congregation an insightful and humorous resume of his father. At the wake many additions to the anecdotes were delivered.

The Trentham Bowling Club mourns the loss of Billy O'Connell, a devoted bowler, mentor, and cherished member for more than 35 years. Billy's unwavering dedication to the club and its community made him a respected figure on and off the green.

A talented competitor, Billy was a two-time Club Champion (2000, 2016) and achieved remarkable success in pairs, winning the Club Pairs Championship ten times between 1995 and 2017. In recognition of his commitment and service, he was awarded Life Membership in 2011. Billy played a pivotal role in some of the club's milestone achievements. He skipped Trentham Bowling Club's first Division 2 pennant win and was instrumental in the club's first Saturday pennant victory in 2000/01. Off the green, he contributed as President (1996–97), long-standing Committee Member, coach, umpire, tournament representative, selector, and a valued Match Committee member.

His dedication extended far beyond play. Billy spent countless hours cutting and maintaining the green, tending to the surrounds, and attending every working bee. He took particular pride in maintaining the hedge and was known for practising multiple times a week, often reminding others that "no one practices enough".

Billy's presence at the club was marked by his generosity, humility, and good humour. He never sought recognition but gave wholeheartedly to ensure the club thrived. His guidance inspired younger players, and his legacy is etched into the club's culture and community spirit.

The Trentham Bowling Club extends heartfelt condolences to Billy's family and friends. His contributions, character, and love for the game will be remembered with respect, gratitude, and deep affection.


In 2026 it's back in the newly renovated Mechanics Trentham - Thursday 2 April to Monday 6 April

Trentham PS 1588 Celebrates 150 Years!

One hundred and fifty years ago a little wooden school was built on Bridge Street, Trentham. It replaced two nearby schools which had previously been established by local identities who recognized the importance of education in a changing world.

Proclaimed by the Education Authorities in 1875, PS1588 was on its way and without any fanfare! Approximately 18 schools in and around the district, stretching from Ashbourne to Blackwood, came and went between1860 and 1960 with the last, Chanters Lane School's five enrolled children transferring to Tylden PS 621.

One hundred and fifty years later only the Trentham and Tylden schools are still going strong. On Sunday 23 November 2025, a large, enthusiastic and slightly aged group of past students browsed the grounds, supported the sausage sizzle, helped raise funds with wine purchases, got faces painted, attended class, checked out photos and met up with old friends and school mates.

Perhaps the most 'senior' girls present were Dr Merrilyn Murnane, who recently celebrated her 90th birthday and her sister Loris, whose mother attended the school at the turn of the last century! Also, 86 year old Mr Holmes from Blackburn had sharp memories of his happy days at Trentham Primary, many of which he shared with this writer as he marvelled at the changes from his school days soon after World War Two.

Trentham & District Historical Society provided valuable support to the enthusiastic group of volunteers who prepared the historic display which proved very popular. It was an opportunity for many visitors to share jokes, reminisce, and even share some secrets. It was also a valuable experience for our committee members to meet many ex-locals who had travelled from Geelong, Wangaratta, Bendigo and Warrnambool, to relive a part of their happy past. If only we had more time to listen!

Fortunately much of the day's activities have been recorded and hopefully future pupils, families and Trentham folk in general will get to look back at more of the Good Old Days, and hopefully consider, yes, they were the Best Days!

Blue Mount Cemetery: 150 years on


North of and just below the summit of Blue Mountain (only 5km south of Trentham), sits Blue Mount Cemetery, gazetted in June 1875 for public burials.

Mrs Henry Garlick, picnicking at the site with her miner husband a year previously declared it where she wanted her "resting place" (Bertrand & Petherbridge, TDHS, 2025).

Others obviously shared this view. The 1874 petition of 48 residents noted that "shortly after the Blackwood diggings were opened deceased persons in the Blue Mountain district were interred on [the mountain]... and have continued to be. The number ... amounts to about sixty. [Locals wish] to be interred near their friends, and [we] request you proclaim the ground a public burial

ground" (Hitchcock, Blue Mount Publishing, undated).

A visit last month by TDHS showed that the charm of the



Sadly, cemetery records for Blue Mount have long been blighted by fire. All were lost when early sexton and undertaker William Miller's house burnt to the ground. Then, extraordinarily, many years later, the same occurred to Clarrie Donald's house and the records within it.

However, TDHS has been fortunate in 2025 to receive from Arie Baelde the product of his extensive research. Using a wide range of sources, Baelde has identified 365 names of those buried at Blue Mount, the first from 1860, with at least 50 buried prior to the cemetery's official gazetting. The bulk occurred in the late 19th century (270 up until 1900), then 35 from 1917 to the last as recent as 1985.

So while the story of this lovely, peaceful cemetery is rarely told, its significance remains keenly felt. It's well worth a visit in the drier months if you have a 4WD.

Councillor's Report

Community news

Congratulations to the organising committee for arranging a fitting celebration for Trentham Primary School's 150th anniversary. Also, the primary school students again made a wonderful contribution to the Remembrance Day service.

Council news

Key outcomes from the November Council meeting. I tabled a condolence motion to mark the sad passing of **Bill O'Connell**. A gifted footballer, cricketer and lawn bowler Bill was never far away from sport and is held in very high esteem by the clubs he served so well. He will be fondly remembered, respected and admired for his significant contributions to the community, his friendly yarns and sharp wit. A true gentleman in every sense of the word Bill will be sadly missed but very fondly remembered.

Council resolved to **dispose of seven properties** that have been deemed as surplus to requirements. These are 79A Raglan Street, Daylesford; 26 Raglan Street, Creswick; 10 Camp Street, Clunes – "Camp Hill Site"; 10 Semmens Avenue, Creswick; 313 Clunes Road, Creswick; 1 Armstrong Street, Daylesford; and 2 Creswick Road, Clunes.

Providers of **affordable housing** will be encouraged to submit expressions of interest for the first five named properties as they are considered to be particularly suitable for the development of affordable housing.

Pleasingly the ill-advised notion of selling the park known as **Rea lands in Daylesford** has been thwarted. Council resolved to retain ownership of the land and support its continuing use by the community.

With regard to the provision of **sport and recreational facilities in Clunes** Council resolved to continue work on a master plan to improve the existing site. Options to upgrade facilities have been costed at between \$7m and \$16m on the current site. Planning for relocation to a new greenfield site, at an estimated cost in excess of \$30m, will be ceased.

Council's **ten-year financial plan** does not include funding for the construction of any new assets in the Shire. Work to redevelop the current site will therefore be highly dependent on grant funding.

Following concerns raised by community members last summer councillors asked officers to explore how Council facilities could be made accessible to community members for the purpose of **respite on extreme weather days**. I encouraged and supported such an initiative as it would be consistent with the strategic intent of Council's health and wellbeing plan and that it would specifically assist the more vulnerable members of our community. A trial over this coming summer would gather relevant data and could be implemented with the assistance of community groups, organisations and volunteers. The motion to make Council facilities accessible was lost 6-1.

Council will provide educational information, create a map of cooling spaces and encourage membership to Open Access libraries. In the example of Trentham the meeting and function rooms of the Mechanics will remain closed on extreme weather days.

The meeting considered the **financial reports for the three months to 30 September**. Many projects and capital works have started the financial year slowly, as evidenced by operating costs being \$1m under budget for the period and only \$700,000 of the \$19m full-year capex budget being spent. Despite that subdued rate of spending the quarter was cash negative – the bank balance falling from \$13.3m at 30 June to \$11m at 30 September.

Some \$4.5m of rates income is overdue. My concern is not only for the organisation's cashflow but for the number of ratepayers struggling to pay rates as they fall due. The amount of arrears is up slightly on the same time last year. The \$4.5m overdue balances are owed by 2115 ratepayers – 1319 of whom are residential ratepayers. About 13% of those residential ratepayers are on payment arrangements. I would encourage any ratepayers who are finding it difficult to pay rates on time to contact Council.

Council considered an application from the **Daylesford**Cinema Group for \$50,000 funding to enable the acquisition of projection and sound equipment. The funding would be sourced from the \$2.1m reserve created from the proceeds of the sale of the Rex, specifically for the community facilities that were originally intended to be housed in the Rex. I supported the application on the grounds a cinema would provide a valuable entertainment asset for the whole Shire; the project's alignment with Council's policies; the project's strong community support (as evidenced by an impressive fundraising effort); and in recognition of Council's prior commitments to assist the cinema group. The application was denied in a 3-4 vote, with councillors Hewitt, Cornish, Hockey and Henderson declining support.

Other Council news

The much-anticipated **outdoor gym equipment** is being installed at Trentham sportsground and is due to be available in December.

I have requested the **public rubbish bins in High St** be replaced... or at the very least cleaned.

Council is about to commence its **annual gravel road re-sheet program and road reseal program**. The affected roads will be:



Nearly inevitably, an essay on blue is followed by one on orange

After visits to the Rijksmuseum in Amsterdam, the painter Vincent van Gogh wrote enthusiastically about the 17th century group-paintings, of citizen's militias celebrating their sumptuous meals, richly dressed for the occasion, displaying the colours of their company banners, including generous orange, a colour historically scarcely used in Dutch painting, but noticeably 'exploding' during the 80 years' war against the king of Spain and the prevailing centralization policies of the rulers of the time, kings and dukes all over 16th – 18th century Europe. Only Venice and Nederland ended up as republics, all other countries remained monarchies till the mid-19th century.

Orange was a Dutch princedom in the South of France, only recently returned to the French government by its Dutch counterpart. The town Orange in NSW Australia maintains active-, historical and friendly connections with its Dutch origins through its current people, and a local winery...

During WWII orange became a forbidden colour and rallying sign of resistance against foreign occupation. And regardless of its heraldic, historical and political connotations, the colour orange reigns sovereign in the world of colours as a power in her own right. Nature has an organic tendency to complete what remains unfinished in her realm: orange is named a 'complementary' colour, which means: stare a long time into a blue field, look away from it, and the eye will fill itself with orange, and vice versa.


Bright-eyed Brown Butterfly season is nearly here!

Fire hazard inspections

Hepburn Shire Council has started its fire hazard inspection program this month to help the community prepare for the upcoming fire danger period.



The Country Fire Authority has announced that the Fire Danger Period began on 24 November in Hepburn Shire. Cr Don Henderson, said now is the time for everyone to prepare.

"Fire prevention is a shared responsibility. By maintaining our properties and reducing fuel loads early, we all contribute to a safer and more prepared Hepburn Shire this summer," said Cr Don Henderson.

Council officers will inspect properties across the Shire to identify long grass, overgrown vegetation, and other potential fire hazards. These inspections form part of Council's responsibility under the Country Fire Authority Act 1958 to help reduce the risk of bush and grass fires.

"Property owners with identified hazards may receive a fire prevention notice requiring works to be completed within a set timeframe," said Cr Don Henderson.

Council encourages all residents and landowners to act early by mowing grass, clearing debris, trimming overhanging branches and ensuring access for emergency vehicles.

"Bush and grass fires can start and spread quickly, so every step taken now helps protect people, homes, livestock and the local environment," said Cr Don Henderson.


