

FORUM UPDATE

We're rapidly approaching the date of the Community Forum AGM - please make a note in your diary, now! Instead of having a guest speaker, we'll use the opportunity to hold one of several Community Consultation Sessions to explore the top 5 issues from the Community Survey (other sessions will be held in the same week, at different times to allow lots of people to participate). All residents of Trentham and surrounds are welcome to attend the AGM and the community meetings - you don't have to be a member.

The session will follow the official business of the AGM and will be run by a professional external facilitator with special expertise in community projects and collaboration. The draft report on the Community Survey will be available to everyone in a couple of weeks.

One outcome of the Consultation sessions will be the creation of a Working Party to develop a new Community Plan, which is long overdue. There will be sub-teams focused on each of the key issues from the Survey, looking for ideas and recommendations on how best to address them. Your involvement is encouraged and there will be a number of ways to participate. The draft Community Plan will also be distributed to the community for comment and input. We have a tight deadline – for the elements of the Community Plan to be included in the 2020/21 Council Budget, it needs to be submitted by early November.

The Forum Committee invites all residents to come and be part of this important step in the future of Trentham. We would love to see you there.

WORDS IN WINTER FILM SCREENING: DEAD LETTER OFFICE (1998)

Words in Winter film screening: Dead Letter Office (1998), Saturday 17 August at 1pm, Trentham Neighbourhood Centre, gold coin donation.


Writer-director John Ruane is a graduate of La Trobe University (where he studied Latin American History) and Swinburne Film and Television School (where he studied film directing). In 1976 he co-wrote and directed the award-winning short feature Queensland, starring John Flaus. His next short feature was Feathers (1987), which was screened out of competition at the Cannes Film Festival. Popular and critical success came with the feature-length comedy-drama Death in Brunswick (1991), starring Sam Neil.

Dead Letter Office (1998) was his second full-length feature film, made with long-term collaborator Ellery Ryan as cinematographer. It did not do as well commercially or critically as its predecessors, though Tom Ryan described it (Sunday Age, 23 August 1998) like this: 'Dead Letter Office is a deceptively simple but disarmingly touching gem, its emotional flavours lingering long after it's over.'

Words in Winter is offering you a rare chance to see this film, introduced by its director. John will talk afterwards about the craft of film-making, and the audience will have the opportunity to ask questions.

Mic Night



COUNCILLOR'S CORNER

Cr. Licia Kokocinski

A roadmap for the construction of the Trentham Community Centre

After much consultation with various parties and stakeholders, I have developed an option for the construction of a new Community Centre in High St. Trentham incorporating a renovated and refurbished Mechanics Institute. In a few words, the option presented breaks the project into two distinct stages.

- Stage one will be to construct a new Centre next to the current Mechanics Institute.
- Stage two involves renovating and refurbishing the Mechanics Institute, guided by experts.

After completion, it is proposed that a Section 86 Special Committee of Council be established to govern the facility, made up of representatives of the users and Council representatives.

Of course, there will be ongoing discussions and negotiations with user groups as to their involvement in the overall management, user agreements, managing expectations and indeed, clarifying what Council's needs are as well.

Trentham Recreation Reserve

The CoM of this Reserve, Council, DELWP and I continue to negotiate a resolution of the impasse that currently exists, with the aim of bringing a plan to Council in August this year.

Welcoming new residents to the Shire

On 28 June, the Trentham Neighbourhood Centre, Trentham and Districts Community Bank® Branch, and Council held a getting to know your new residents evening. The small number of attendees provided the opportunity to have a good informal chat about what the community has to offer residents.

Review of Community Grants

Council has reviewed its Community Grants program. Up to end of the 2018/19 financial year, this was a monthly allocation to various community groups upon a successful application. Councillors and officers believed that the program could be improved by streamlining the funding categories and dispersing funds quarterly. For groups in Coliban who may be interested in applying, they should consult the Shire's website or contact me by email or mobile telephone.

NAIDOC Week & Trentham PS Senior Choir

Trentham PS Senior choir will, in early August, be part of a massed choir of 300 children from across Victoria performing at the Melbourne Town Hall, in Boite Millenium Choir performing from the Dhungala Songbook. The performance will be led by Deborah Cheetham, indigenous opera singer and composer and Jesse Hitchcock. I am sure our young people will sing their hearts out and be marvellous ambassadors for the Shire and the Trentham community in particular. So, if you can attend, do so and support these young people and their families.

Trentham Childcare Facility

I am pleased to advise that there will be a 'turning of the sod' to symbolise the commencement of the construction phase of the Trentham Childcare facility on 8 August 2019. This has been a hot topic and need for families with pre-school children. Families have been waiting years for this facility. The history is that the kindergarten was refurbished during 2018/19. The extension of the kindergarten will result in an integrated childcare facility that will include the continuation of 4 yearold kindergarten and the roll out of 3 year old funded kindergarten places in 2021. There will be capacity for up to 22 childcare places. Staffing will depend upon the ages of the children requiring care.

NOTE FROM THE SHIRE:

COMMUNITY GRANT PROGRAM TO OPEN SOON

The 2019/20 Hepburn Shire Council Community Grants Program will open on 1 August 2019.

The program provides \$62,000 annually to community groups and organisations to fund projects which benefit the residents of the Hepburn Shire community.

Mayor, Cr Don Henderson, said that the program has helped community groups deliver some great projects.

"Council's Community Grants Program has helped local not-for-profit groups and organisations, including sporting clubs, bring their ideas to life. We've allocated funding to equipment for a brass band, sporting equipment and helped with marketing materials for community led projects," said Cr Don Henderson.

Community groups and organisations will have the opportunity to apply for funding on a quarterly basis.

The key dates for round 1 are:

OPENING DATE 1 August 2019
CLOSING DATE 5 September 2019
COUNCIL MEETING DATE 15 October 2019

This funding program links to the Hepburn Shire Council Plan. Successful applicants will need to demonstrate how their project links to the program objectives in one of the five Community Grants Program categories:

- 1. Active and Engaged Communities (up to \$2,500)
- Quality Community Infrastructure (including small equipment) (up to \$2,500)
- 3. Sustainable Environments (up to \$2,500)
- 4. Children's Program (up to \$2,500)
- 5. Charitable Purposes (up to \$2,000)

MEN'S SHED AT LOCK-UP STAGE



Cool Country Men's Shed, situated at 55 Mulcahys Road, has reached lock-up stage!

The shed itself, built by Gavin Owen and his men from Apex Sheds, Ballan, is finished. Its walls and roof are an attractive Gully Green, windows, solid-core metal doors and a roller door are fitted. Utilities – power, water, sewer and water tank – are ready to be connected.

The Committee is delighted with the Shed's spaciousness, and somewhat amazed that the project has reached this stage! It now faces the task of fitting it out. Three pallets of donated new plywood will be used to line the walls, a double sink has been given, and good quotes have been obtained from local firms for the materials needed.

Committee members Ian Hansford, Steve Adams and Tony Johnston have made several trips to pick up six workbenches, two welding tables and benches from a school near Ballarat that no longer has use for them. They are now in the Shed!

Saturday 27 July saw locals who registered interest in the Shed gather at the site to enjoy a barbeque and get started on jobs needing doing.

"I sometimes think I'm dreaming," says the Shed's President, Tony Johnston. "It's been a lot of work, mostly enjoyable. But I'm looking forward even more to enjoying the Shed itself!"

The Committee is looking towards an official opening in November.



Response from Ian MacBean to Hepburn Council Advertisement - July Trumpet

It was somewhat encouraging to read Council's list of projects in Trentham and surrounds.

As stated, the advertisement was in response to questions raised by residents asking about 'the volume of . . . projects in Trentham. It seems that at last Council may be responding to long-standing calls for 'rate equity' and a fair go for Trentham.

However, by including projects 'completed, in progress . . . planned or earmarked', Council has inflated the apparent volume of works happening in Trentham or to happen in future.

The advertisement warrants closer scrutiny to put the picture it seeks to paint into a clearer perspective.

1. Council reports only \$629,000 (34%) of the projects listed for 'Carry Forward + 2018/19' as completed.

Projects don't fit neatly into a single year and many are therefore listed as 'in progress'. These include 'carried forward' projects from earlier years, e.g. the incomplete Streetscape project was first funded 3 years ago. Several other projects budgeted for 2018/19 have not even started. (there are 21 projects in total, 4 mentioned below . . . probably should stay if we can)

Road works are identified in the report's introduction as another area of expenditure. Council has still seen fit to list the Chanters Lane upgrade (\$250,000), thereby skewing the picture for discretionary capital expenditure. Road works are undertaken according to long-term maintenance schedules and funded separately in the budget. If the purpose of this advertisement is to convince us that Trentham is getting a fair go then including high cost road works seriously distorts the picture. Even so, Coliban Ward, which pays 16% of total rates, is allocated only 6% of the 2019/20 road works budget.

2. The list of projects seems extensive, including projects ranging widely in cost including:

- (i) \$5,000 Place Making project held community consultations in May, 2018 with nothing heard since;
- (ii) \$34,000 Domino Trail project (gravel between Station St and Falls Rd), including a contribution from Catherine King MHR, received in early 2016: works are still to be completed clearly not a priority!
- (iii) the welcome \$363,000 Netball Facilities upgrade, funded from a shandy of sources, including \$149,000 from the Open Space Reserve or sub-division levy.;
- (iv) the urgently needed Kindergarten & Childcare facility (\$544,000), listed for 2018/19, has yet to start.

3. \$2.02M worth of projects are listed for 2019/20 + Future

Very few of these projects are in fact in the 2019/20 Budget – see Brian Hood's letter in the July Trumpet. Again, after excluding future road works, the only projects funded in this year's Budget are the first stage of the Quarry St Reserve project and 'completion' of the kindergarten/childcare project. These represent 7% of Council's capital works yet, to repeat, Coliban Ward contributes 16% of Council's rate income. So, from a promising \$1.5M+ list of projects (excluding road works) only \$186,500 of new funding will be delivered in 2019/20. Of course, previously funded projects will be carried forward giving the appearance of more activity.

The Hub project appears to be on an indefinite timeframe leaving the Sportsground Facilities upgrade as the only substantial new project in the coming year.

So, Council's list in the Trumpet is a bank-up of past, current and prospective projects (i.e. spanning a 5/6-year timeframe) whose purpose appears to be to paint a rosy picture of works in and around Trentham.

Council's financials over the past 5 years show a disturbing disparity in the value of works carried out in Coliban: \$1M compared to almost \$25M across the other 4 Wards.

What is needed is an independent audit or investigation of all major capital projects over the life of Hepburn Shire so that this apparent entrenched inequity can be quantified once and for all.

Council should then consult with the community to identify the investments required to ensure Coliban Ward has the infrastructure and services needed to resource the existing population, current strong growth and expected future growth.

What we don't want, or need is Council using its considerable resources (i.e. our rates) to 'snow' Trentham with misleading information.

We need proper planning, consultation and our fair share!

The Local Government Act was reformed in 2018 requiring Councils:

- to involve their community in developing policy and long-term planning, and
- to empower community members to set the agenda for their municipality through a Community Vision.

This requires a respectful and meaningful engagement through iterative face-to-face consultation processes (not perfunctory, one-way consultation).

Rate equity and policy regarding the open space levy seem like good places to start.

Z-NET TRENTHAM NEWS UPDATE

Trentham community organisations are benefiting from the Z-NET program and going solar.

The Hepburn Wind Energy Fund donated \$9,000 for a 6.325kW solar system for the Trentham Neighborhood Centre in June. The Neighborhood Centre contributed \$610 to the installation.

The next roof to go solar – thanks to the Hepburn Solar Bulk Buy's 'community bonus' and Hepburn Shire Council's Towards Zero grants, will be the Trentham Primary School. A 10.5kW system worth \$14,465 will be installed in the coming month. The Primary School contributed \$1,000 to make the solar possible.

These donated systems free up much-needed cash that would otherwise go on electricity bills to be redirected into other services and, just as importantly, contribute to reducing our community's carbon emissions.

The Z-NET Project is an ambitious and exciting 10-year Masterplan for the Hepburn Shire to reach 100% renewable electricity supply, zeronet energy and zero-net emissions 2019 – 2029. For the full Z-NET Community Transition Plan and associated documentation go to -www.z-net.org.au/hepburn

HISTORICAL BUSH POETRY

Bush Poetry has been around Trentham for over 150 years. The Trewhella brothers from Cornwall arrived in the local goldfields in 1855. Ben Trewhella Senior's poems still survive. He wrote about politics, family, and his own history:

"The month of June in Fifty Five

Beheld us camped at Simmon's Reef,

A place with diggers then alive

Though many have made their stay but brief.

A few with golden holes were blessed,

While disappointment crowned the rest."

The Historical Society recognised Trentham's joy of and talent for bush poetry and created the Bruce McKenzie Award to honour our good friend who died only last year aged 92 years.

When the famous Dr Gwen Wisewould died, Bruce took up his pen in an ode:

"She drove that old utility up hills that were so steep,

And toiled with aching body, and with eyes that knew no sleep.

Our Doctor Gwen – she cared for us for over thirty years.

She possessed that wondrous spirit of our early pioneers."

Bruce wrote about a devilish bushfire:

"But the wind rose up in the heat of the day till it whined like a banshee wail,

And the smoke that burned our blinding eyes came in on a raging gale,

And the sound of the wind was the Devil's song and the song was the dirge of death,

And the searing flames, all red with lust, danced in the Devil's breath."

And he wrote whimsically of his own end:

"So I hope where ends the highway, and St Peter guards the place,

When he's tallied up my score of shame and sin,

He will find the Scales of Justice tilt in favour of my case

And he'll swing aside the gate and let me in."

Bruce's life, loves and tall stories will be told in his own poetry on August 17th at Wyld Thyme with a three-course meal interspersed with his poetry. Limited tickets may still be available from Susie Spence 5424 1721 or susan.spence@bigpond.com.



TRUFFLES AT THE CWA:

I had the absolute pleasure of talking about truffles at the latest CWA luncheon. I did open with that statement but added that I was relieved that I did not have to do any cooking. I remember watching Master Chef where the contestants cooked for the CWA and they did not do to well, I don't think any contest got the marble right in the marble cake!!

15 years ago 3 friends formed Aussie Truffle Dogs with the view to harvesting truffle. We had a breed that we believed would make the perfect truffle dog – 12 weeks of the year, and assimilate into the best family companion for the other 40 weeks. Of course, as time went on, we not only harvested and trained truffle dogs, but began truffière maintenance and starting selling truffle straight into restaurants and at the farm gate. We established a 1200 tree truffière here in Trentham and were the first to produce truffles locally. We tend to only sell into the region and pride ourselves on getting fresh truffles into the restaurants straight after harvest. It's not unusual for me to arrive in my gumboots with a dog or two in the car.

We planted the 4 varieties of truffle allowed to be cultivated in Australia, which are - the most widely known truffle, the Perigourd black truffle – melanasporum; the summer truffle – Astevum; the small Italian white truffle – Borkii; and the large Italian white truffle – Magnatum, which is still only harvested in the wild. Magnatum likes wet feet and grows along water courses in the wild and obtains its nutrients when flooding occurs. We are still trying to cultivate Magnatum, and with a hefty price of about \$6000 a kilo it'll be worth it.

In Australia we have 3 main tree varieties onto which truffle is inoculated. Hazelnut; Quercus Robour – English oak; and Quercus Iilex – Holly Oak. Your soil needs to be tested and altered so that the PH is between 7.5 and 8.2. We do annual soil testing. Truffles need a fair bit of water and once the truffle sporns (Nov-Dec) must be kept moist until harvest from June to Sept. Inoculated trees are planted and nurtured for a number of years and if everything is right you are lucky enough to produce truffle. Rule of thumb is 6 years, we didn't get any for 8 years which I think that I am to blame for. My trees have been heavily pruned, as I am the person harvesting and it is so much easier if you are not being slapped in the face with branches as you go. As a harvester I am continually looking at the ground for signs of truffle.

Martin is joined on stage by a host of award winning singers and rising stars of opera and music theatre.


