## **IMPORTANT NOTICE** ABOUT CHANGES TO MOBILE LIBRARY SERVICE:

#### TRENTHAM'S PUBLIC LAND

After many years of neglect some action is currently taking place to remove weeds and improve access to the Bath Street and Park Street reserves. The Hepburn Shire is the Committee of Management for the Bath Street reserve beside the Mechanics Institute Hall. They have been successful in obtaining the services of a Green Corps Team of 10 young trainees and a supervisor for 6 months. It is hoped that they will be able to remove weeds, plant some areas, develop and erect signage and build walkways to allow access.

The locally elected Committee of Management for the Park Street reserve on which the Bowling Club, Lions storage shed and the Skate Board Park operate has undertaken some weed control funded by DSE. They have recently submitted an application for funding through the Envirofund grants program to continue this work and to improve access by the public.

Hepburn Shire Council contribution to health and environment Hepburn Shire Council has contributed to a state wide increase of green purchasing.

The Municipal Association of Victoria recently announced that Victorian councils had smashed all previous green purchasing records, spending \$80 million during the past financial year, on products that cause less damage to our environment and our health, an increase of \$43 million from the year before.

The Hepburn Shire Council's expenditure on green products increased from \$158,000 in 2004 to over \$309,000 in 2005.

Hepburn Shire Council Director of Infrastructure and Development Rod Conway said the Council's commitment to using green products would increase again this year with a recent move to using green power for both street lighting and office power. The Hepburn Shire Council is among Victorian council's to have joined ECO-Buy, a program that supports local government and businesses in purchasing environmentally friendly products.

ECO-Buy is a joint initiative of Sustainability Victoria, the delivery agency for the Government's Framework for Environmental Sustainability; the Victorian Greenhouse Strategy, the Department of Sustainability and Environment (with a plan to reduce Victoria's greenhouse emissions), and of the Municipal Association of Victoria, the peak body for Victorian Local Government.

#### **Community planning**

New structure plans, to form part of the Hepburn Shire Planning Scheme to determine how towns will be shaped in the future, are being finalised for Daylesford, Hepburn Springs, Trentham, Clunes and Creswick.

The Hepburn Shire Council has engaged the services of consultant David Robb from Planit Urban Design and Strategic Planning to complete the process.

A review of the Daylesford, Hepburn Springs and Trentham structure plans began in late 2003. Reviews for Clunes and Creswick began early 2005.

All have included comprehensive community input.

The review process will be completed with the preparation of a planning scheme amendment which will include the revised structure plans for each town.

The structure plan reviews included a series of workshops involving the community, resulting in the structure plans being revised complete with vision statements and objectives.

For Daylesford, Hepburn Springs and Trentham the draft documents were put out for public consultation and comment with the community consultation process now complete for these towns. This community consultation and comment process is currently taking place for the Clunes and Creswick structure plans.

It is proposed that the drafting of the planning scheme amendments will be completed and placed on public exhibition by July.

Hepburn Shire Council Manager of Planning and Economic Development Judith Bedford said the process involved community participation at the grass roots level, from the very beginning of the project rather than at the stage where the formal exhibition of the planning scheme amendment occurs.

The community consultation process adopted by Council for this project included a series of workshops held for each town where residents were asked how they would like to see their area develop in the future.

The revised structure plans for each of the towns will include both written objectives and maps that highlight future directions for development, as well as identify specific issues and opportunities to enhance the towns. "Members of the community were invited to express their vision of what kind of place they wished to live in the future."

"Involving the community from the very beginning was a positive initiative for both Council, Council staff and the community," she said.

"The process has incorporated the concept of sustainability and involved the community in each town identifying issues they want included in their structure plan, as well as developing the associated objectives and the vision for their area."

"Residents were asked to help determine what degree sustainability was thought possible and how it be applied," Ms Bedford said.

Community input and ideas from previous studies and forums have been used as part of the process, for example for Creswick the town's Community Development Plan is being used as part of the process.

The draft revised structure plans will lay the ground work for a planning scheme amendment which will replace the existing structure plans in the Hepburn Planning Scheme.

The draft revised structure plans documents have been written in a language which is community friendly," Ms Bedford said.

Working groups made community members have been part of the process to ensure the plans reflect the community's wishes.

"Part of the job of the consultant will now be to translate the draft documents prepared in consultation with the various communities into a formal amendment to the Hepburn Planning Scheme."

"The community consultation phase is still taking place for the Creswick and Clunes structure plans and it is hoped once this is complete that planning scheme amendments will be in place by July," Ms Bedford said.

"But if you have other ideas about how you could run a community kitchen we would like to hear about them too," Mr Dunn said.

A community kitchen project has been successfully implemented in Frankston based on international models - community kitchens are popular in Canada.

Mr. Dunn said community kitchens proved to be popular as food and eating provided a good reason for a social event.

"Families usually come together for meals or special occasions over a meal but for instance people who live on their own often don't have the opportunity to experience or share this and a community kitchen can provide this social element.

"Community kitchens also provide an alternative approach to promote healthy eating and the development of personal skills and social support within the networks community."
