

EDITOR'S LETTER



With the improving weather my focus is still on the garden and all things outdoorsy.

I was lucky enough recently to inherit 10 chickens (including 2 roosters) to add to my own very small flock of two. The new flock has settled in well however the original two are somewhat put out by having their run taken over by this invading horde. They spend much of their time on the outer and whenever I'm nearby appeal in their little chicken voices to please put things back to how they once were.

The asparagus patch is generating the first of the spring harvest or would be if not for whatever it was that chopped the tops off the emerging spears. A cover may be necessary or perhaps a companion crop to hide those enticing morsels poking up through the ground.

The plum is covered in flowers as are the dwarf peaches. We've spotted a few hoverflies and some nectar eating birds however no sign of bees. Unless the days warm up fairly quickly they'll be no stone fruit this season. Fingers crossed the other fruit trees and berries will produce a reasonable crop to enjoy over Christmas and in the new year.

By the time you read this the frost sensitive seeds will be planted in pots to germinate. Once the frosts have passed they'll be good strong seedlings to go straight into the garden. Then it will be a matter of keeping an eye on the weather and putting into action the "saving everything from a late frost plan" when required!

I hope you enjoy the October Trumpet.

CFA REPORT

Recent wet weather will delay the onset of dangerous conditions this year but landholders and town residents alike should continue to carry out their preparations for the summer.

As well as checking pumps and pipes that may have deteriorated during the winter and clearing all combustible material from around buildings, people are urged to have a fire plan that goes beyond the simple intention to drive away from home before a fire arrives.

The brigade has noted that, when asked, "What will you do, if for some reason, you cannot leave early?" many people have no fallback plan. Electricity supply can be cut hours before a bushfire arrives. Lights and garage roller doors may not work when expected.

Car motors may not start when needed on very hot days. Strong winds may drop heavy tree branches across a road. So besides, "Leave Early," it makes sense to have a back-up plan in case the family unexpectedly has to, "Stay And Defend".


The six gardens are Vizla Lak, Throssell's Mill, Wallaby Creek, Jenny's Garden, Greenlion, Adsum Farm.

Small Business Restructures

The government recently passed into law new small business rollover rules.

The new rules are designed to enable any small business to restructure their business without Capital Gains Tax (CGT). Rollover is generally available providing the following conditions are met:

- Both entities involved are small business entities (turnover less than \$2 million dollars or net assets less than \$6 million).
- There is no change in the ultimate economic ownership of the significant business assets.
- 3. Those significant assets continue to be active assets
- 4. No significant private use of these active assets.

The rollover relief rules apply from 1 July 2016 to transfers between sole traders, companies, partnerships or trusts.

Consider Jake's Case:


Jake is thinking of restructuring his Earthmoving business which turns over \$1 million per annum. Currently a company he is looking to trade as a trust. Jake owns 100% of the shares in the company. Jake's advisor sets up a Trust called Jakes Trust and Jake is made the test individual in the Family Trust Election. There is no change in beneficial ownership. The business assets continue to be used in the trust and they are not used outside of the business. Jake can therefore apply the CGT rollover relief. Jake may need to consider GST and stamp duty.

"The Trentham Historical Society has been a great help with records and old photos," Sgt Gardiner said.

WARTIME MYSTERIES IN WOODEND

Macedon Ranges Film Society's September screening featured the compelling drama 'The Imitation Game'.

Based loosely on Andrew Hodges biography of Alan Turing, the film stars Benedict Cumberbatch as the real life cryptanalyst Alan Turing. Turing worked for British military during WW2 designing and building a 'computer-like' decoding machine to decrypt German military messages. In so doing, helped shorten the war saving many lives.

The film, also starring Kiera Knightley as Joan Clark, Turing's assistant and faux love interest, touches on attitudes to, and vilification of, homosexuality. Turing, a homosexual, was prosecuted as such in 1952. He committed suicide in 1954.

Another contentious issue addressed in the film was that having cracked the code, the British kept this a secret so the Germans would not be alerted to the fact that their information was known; as a result, some acts of war were allowed to be committed against the British, costing many lives.

The Macedon Ranges Film Society meets on the second Wednesday each month at Woodend Community Centre. Film notes and an informal supper are part of the evening.

eBook is not a dirty word!

eBooks, eAudiobooks, magazines, newspapers of the world and films are available to all library members... and they are all free! All you need is an internet connection and your library card.

We have two eBook providers: Bolinda and Overdrive that offer a wide range of titles that can be downloaded to a computer, Tablet, iPad or eBook reader (except Kindle) including Fiction, Nonfiction (even Lonely Planet guidebooks), Young Adult and Children's titles.

Both Bolinda and Overdrive also offer eAudiobooks which can be downloaded onto an iPod or MP3 player. The eBooks and eAudiobooks work in a similar way to borrowing a physical book, they have a 4 week loan period, can be reserved if it's out and you will be notified when the item becomes available for you. After the 4 week loan period, you can renew or return.

Our newest database collection, Beamafilm contains over 300 Documentary and Independent films that can be streamed on a computer, tablet, iPad or smart TV. There are some fantastic films and lots of Australian content including 'The Triangle Wars' about the fight to save the St Kilda foreshore area from development, 'Matilda and Me' about the new musical based on the Roald Dahl story, 'That Sugar Film' and Paul Kelly's 'Stories of Me'.

Press Display gives access to newspapers from over 95 different countries. You can read today's paper from Egypt, Albania, Finland and Iran.

Zinio allows you to browse over 100 popular magazines including Home Beautiful, Organic Gardener, Country Style, Golf Digest, Harpers Bazaar, Just Cars, Men's Health, New Scientist, National Geographic, Smith Journal to name but a few.

So many people have guilt about utilising eBooks, or will say 'I've crossed over to the dark side.' We think it's OK, you're reading, just in a different format!

LIVING IN A DANCE WITH UNCERTAINTY

In 'The Ethical Imagination' Margaret Somerville suggests that prior to cultivating 'old virtues for a new world' (2004), we must learn to live with uncertainty...

In his Words in Winter Trentham presentation of "This Jesus Story" on 27 August, Peter Fernon suggests to dance as a way of living with uncertainty and begins his story with it. His way of telling this story, thoroughly grounded in scripture and in his own experience, captures both our modern consciousness, a reading of the gospels riddled with uncertainty as well as the extraordinary, stable integrity of this Jesus person who came to fulfil the law, not to abolish it.

The strange paradox of the Sermon on the Mount, where it is the poor of spirit, the weak, the vulnerable that will inherit the kingdom... the mother puzzled by a 12-year-old son, who insists on attending to the affairs of his father and then - grown up - seemingly reluctant to produce the wine. Peter's presentation is a strong, imaginative integration of music, poetry, storytelling, dance and theatre.

The narrative, with all its uncertainties and possibilities, as to how this might have happened and how one, 2000 years later, might make sense of it, stays central to it and weaves it – as in a dance – together.

There is a chance to experience and see for yourself: on Saturday 8 October, in the hall at the Anglican Church, Woodend, 7.30 pm, \$20 contribution. For the text of his agile "dance with uncertainty", see elsewhere in this issue.

At our weekly meditation for world peace, we meet where East and West agree and we take living in "the now" as key. This month we take a break and start again on 24 October. For details see Ongoing Events.

GLOBAL ARTS ROMP CONTINUES

The ADFAS CV program is continuing until the end of the year, with specialist presentations on art and urban design from Australasia to the UK and the Middle East.

Escaping the plague epidemic in Sydney in 1900, Australian artist Tom Roberts headed to New Zealand, where he created some little-known masterpieces. Jane Vial, a specialist in early 20th-century Australasian art, spoke to around 100 members and guests on 'Tom Roberts' Adventures in New Zealand' at the 15 September ADFAS CV lecture at the Kyneton Town Hall.

The October lecture will introduce UK art historian Mary Alexander speaking on 'David Hockney: Mr & Mrs Clark - Fashion and Lifestyle Icons of the 1960s'. David Hockney is considered one of the most influential British artists of the 20th century. In his portraits of friends, lovers, and relatives he repeatedly returns to the same subjects, including fashion designers Celia Birtwell and Ossie Clark.

Alexander's lecture will explore Hockney's famous painting, 'Mr and Mrs Clark and Percy' (1970-71), revealing the dramatic tragedy unfolding behind the cool and modernist interior in which the Clarks are represented. The AGM will precede the lecture, so members are asked to arrive at 7pm to sign the register.

Although this is the last lecture for the year, the ADFAS CV program continues to the end of the year, with a speakers' luncheon at Macedon Wine Room on 6 October when retired Woodend architect and urban designer David Faggetter will speak about his unique experience developing an urban design around the ancient oasis in Al Ain in the Abu Dhabi Emirate. A trip to Ballarat is planned on 27 October to view the Archibald Exhibition 2016, followed by the annual Sunset Party on 8 December.

Breast Cancer Awareness

EARLY DETECTION of breast cancer increases the chances of successful treatment and ultimately, survival. It is important to know what is normal for you because everyone is different and as you go through different stages of your life your breasts are continually changing.

Springs Medical Centre is encouraging all women to become proficient at self-examination as this is vital to early detection of abnormalities or changes to the breast. It is good practice to make a regular routine of checking your breasts both visually and by feeling for any lumps or pain.

Visually looking for lumpiness, thickening of tissue, dimpling, puckering, redness, nipple discharge or changes, skin changes or part of the breast feeling different to the rest of the breast.

Feeling the entire breast tissue from the collar bone to below your bra line and into the under arm. Feeling near the surface then deeper using the flat part of your fingers. Feeling your breasts in the bath or shower, lying down or when getting dressed.

If you notice any changes, see your doctor immediately. If you are over 50 have a free screening mammogram every 2 years. If you are 40 or over and have a family history of Breast Cancer you are eligible for a free breast screen.

Men are not to be forgotten as breast cancer is also relevant to them. Although rare in men it is still possible as they also have breast tissue. Men's symptoms are similar to women's.

There is no evidence to support the claim that building the Trentham Hub on council land will not include the function centre and commercial kitchen. Further broad base community consultation will occur to ensure the needs identified through the Facilities Review over three years ago are confirmed. Residents will have the opportunity to advocate what they need. Primary reasons for the site change were that it will provide optimal funding success from State Government and an abundance of parking.

Building the Hub around the Mechanics Hall would have incurred deletion of services. As stated at Cr Klein's August ward meeting, the senior's lounge and Life Activities space would have been deleted and there would have been little on-site parking.

It was stated by Cr Henderson at the August council meeting that the community contribution be waived, due to residents of Clunes, Creswick and Daylesford not having to contribute to their hubs; a proposal that I will advocate for.

The new plan provides a modern community service centre, a heritage community hall with a stage and the opportunity to resurrect the Institute – a win, win, win for Trentham and districts, now and into our growing future. There are scores of people willing and able to manage the Mechanics Institute Reserve, so there is no need to worry about the future of the hall.

The community can look forward to three exciting projects eventuating, so it is time to focus on the next priority project, securing Early Years Services.


