

## COUNCIL ADOPTS NEW TRENTHAM HUB SITE

Council resolved that the Trentham Hub site will be on Council owned land in Victoria Street in Trentham at the Council meeting in Creswick.

Cr Neil Newitt said that the decision was made to move the project forward so that the facility has the best chance of being delivered for the community.

"The decision made by Council is in the interest of developing a Hub incorporating the ideas and facilities that the Trentham people have been asking for."

"We have done a significant amount of consulting with the Trentham community on what their service and community needs are for the Hub. We will meet these needs on the Victoria Street site without impacting on the existing Mechanics Institute."

"The CEO, Ward Councillor and I have met with the Trentham community on many occasions and discussed their needs and views on the Trentham Hub," said Cr Newitt.

Aaron van Egmond, Hepburn Shire Council CEO, said "Council will move forward to ensure that the residents and ratepayers of Trentham have a Hub that delivers the services they need."

Council has committed to further consultation with residents and ratepayers on the design and layout of the Hub at the Victoria Street site.

## **COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES**

The Trentham Trumpet has obtained a copy of the Draft Council Meeting Minutes of 16082016. A full copy of the Draft Minutes is available at www. hepburn.vic.gov.au. The following extract is taken from the Draft Minutes –

6.2. NOTICE OF MOTION - TRENTHAM COMMUNITY SERVICES HUB – SITE SELECTION, DESIGN AND COMMUNITY CONSULTATION

#### **PURPOSE**

The purpose of this motion and report to Council is to decide on a suitable and available site for the Trentham Community Services Hub and to work with the residents and ratepayers regarding the design and content of the Hub on that site so that there is a clear path ahead.

#### **BACKGROUND**

This Notice of Motion is offered to provide a practical way forward for Council and the community by proposing that Council builds the Trentham Community Services Hub on Council owned land at 14A Victoria Street, Trentham. This is seen as a logical and sensible solution to the controversy generated by an earlier proposal to build the Hub on the site of the old Trentham Mechanics Institute at 66 High Street Trentham.

Council's intention has been to demolish the Hall to make way for the new Hub and design plans have been created and exhibited for that purpose. These existing designs and plans for the Hub are immediately available as a starting point to show what could be done at 14A Victoria Street.

An ideal use for this parcel of land would be for the Trentham Community Services Hub, whereby Council would build the Hub on Council's own land.

### ISSUE / DISCUSSION

This proposal allows ...:

- 1. Trentham to get a new Hub and community facility that is fit for purpose and delivers a significant degree of equity with other Hepburn Shire towns; and
- 2. Trentham to also get the opportunity to keep its Mechanics Institute Hall.

### MOTION

That Council:

- 6.2.1. Confirms that the site for the Trentham Community Services Hub shall be Council owned land at 14A Victoria Street. Trentham.
- 6.2.2. Prepares and exhibits design plans for this site as adapted from previously presented design plans for the Hub.
- 6.2.3. Places the design plans for the Trentham Community Services Hub at 14A Victoria Street Trentham on public exhibition for one month and consults widely with residents and ratepayers to invite submissions on the design, layout and content of the Hub.
- 6.2.4. Considers all submissions received from residents and ratepayers before deciding on the final design, costing and content of the Hub and application for Government funding

6.2.5. On adoption of this motion, instructs the Chief Executive Officer and relevant officers to immediately being the process of handing back the management of the current Trentham Mechanics Institute to the relevant government authority, which is the Department of Environment Land Water and Planning (DELWP).

### **COUNCILLOR'S CORNER**

Eight years of working for Trentham causes was brought to a strange and arbitrary crescendo from Hepburn Council on Tuesday the 16th at the Creswick Senior Citizens Centre.

Previously approving of a Citizen's Jury process, Councillors voted 5-2 not to consult further with the Trentham community or compromise on the Hub.

Rather, Cr Bill McClenaghan, who has taken an intense interest in Coliban Ward matters over the past two years, forced the matter. He moved to build the hub wholesale at 14A Victoria St. Effectively gagging me from debate – because the site is next to my house I had to leave the room. In my absence, Councillors voted 4-2 to build the hub at 14A.

At the last minute, Cr McClenaghan also moved to return the Mechanics Institute control to DELWP.

Painfully clear was that no other councillors had actually even spoken to Trentham community members between the motion to consult further and deciding that consultation with the community was not worthwhile.

My fear is that we lose two-fold: firstly, we move no further towards a community consensus, and thus funding remains unlikely with our own internal opposition; and that we lose the opportunity to restore the Mechanics Institute Hall.

Beyond all of that, the community has been disenfranchised.

This fact was further compounded when Councillors voted 6-1 not to even include a feasibility of new clubrooms, a second netball court, or a soccer and cricket pitch in the master planning for the Recreation Reserve.

Over the coming weeks, I will be working hard to determine if Trentham residents think this is good enough. Please feel free to let me know what you think, at my next ward meeting or elsewhere.

### Young, Old, and Inbetweeners

When I started voluntary youth work in Trentham in 2009, the youth, all boys but one, shared their story of bitter disappointment. In 2004, when at primary school, Hepburn Shire came and talked to them about a Skate Park. They were excited!!!! They contributed ideas for the design. The original site was the Recreation Reserve in Market Street; a safe, supervised location out the front of their local hangout Trentham Takeaway. However a small group of residents strongly objected to the site and Council decided to build on the Stony Creek swamp, out of sight. The original design could not be completed due to the bulk of allocated funds going to reinforce the concrete, to prevent the park from sinking. The youth were angry and felt they were second best to the voice of the "oldies" in town. We worked together to "fix up the skate park", fundraised and collaborated with the community to establish the Pocket Park. The swamp is now a wonderful recreation area. If not completed in their teenage years, it is a legacy to their generosity of spirit after the loss of their dream.

Council has decided to build the Trentham Hub on their land in Victoria Street. I appreciate there is some disappointment and grief for the loss of the "New Mechanics". As a strong advocate for the outcome that has prevailed, I now advocate that there be sensitivity around these emotions.

In the words of the Sentimental Bloke, "I hope they'll shake hands when the matter is done".

In the spirit of reconciliation, may I suggest naming the new community centre from the Jaara language of the Dja Dja Wurrung people – just an idea.

## Council drops Mechanics, switches 'hub' to Victoria Street

Hepburn Shire Council decided to wash its hands of Trentham's Mechanics Institute at its meeting on Tuesday, 19 August, and move its 'hub' plans to Victoria Street.

The decision came after a 4-2 vote on a motion from Cr Bill McClenaghan. Management control of the Mechanics Institute returns 'immediately' to the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning.

Local Councillor Sebastian Klein was excluded from the room for the vote, due to a possible conflict of interest, since he lives near the new site. He was to move the next motion, to build the hub around the core of the existing Mechanics building, but (unsurpringly) failed to get a seconder. His proposed compromise arose from community feedback to the Council's unanimous decision in 2014 to build on the Mechanics site.

Charles Sherlock, recorder for pledges towards the \$100,000 community contribution sought by Council, noted that 224 locals had done so. Those who have contributed funds have been contacted: some are waiting on the Council election outcome before claiming theirs back.

The original design – the outcome of a two-year Facilities Review – brought together the Library, Historical Society, Visitor's Information Centre and senior citizen's facilities with a hall able to accommodate 250 people.

Opposition to this development came from 'save the hall' locals, and some wanting to retain its history as a Mechanics Institute - concerns aimed to be met in Cr Klein's motion, which received support at his well-attended Ward meeting the previous Tuesday, 9 August.

### **Vale New Mechanics**

The recent decision by Hepburn Shire Councillors to relocate the proposed Hub [or part of it] from High St to Victoria St, and to retain the Mechanics Institute building in its current form, is a classic example of Council ineptitude and to foist a second-best outcome on Trentham.

Although there will be some who see this result as a victory, there are no winners from this decision. In the long term Trentham will pay dearly, with many of our more active residents and volunteers in all likelihood withdrawing from community affairs.

Who could blame them; after all Council has made several decisions on this project over recent years and all have now effectively been overruled without any proper consideration of a realistic alternative. Hepburn Shire Council has displayed total disrespect for all those members of our community who had committed many hours of unpaid time to further develop ideas which Council had previously approved.

There is no guarantee from Council that the "new solution" at Victoria St will be anything other than a much reduced Hub, only providing space for the Library, Life Activities, Visitor Information Centre, toilets and perhaps one or two meeting rooms and space for the Historical Society - no Hall for 200+ people, no commercial kitchen. Any development of the existing Mechanics Institute will be dependent on the community raising money; in the meantime the existing building will stay as is.

The "compromise" proposal which was discussed and generally approved by the 50-60 participants at the Coliban Ward meeting on 9 August had the potential to create a true COMMUNITY CENTRE for current and future generations; an active, visible, light filled and joyful facility which might draw all Trentham residents through its doors; but not now.

Those who thwarted this concept have much to answer for. A unique opportunity has been lost and Trentham will be much the poorer for it.

She also has a very honest eye that cuts through to her subjects' personality and character rather than seeking to create flattering, prettified reproductions of their images.


As a fellow artist, Tim Jones was happy with her very direct approach.


Hitchcock filmed on a single set with minimal editing – unusual for the time.

# Goods & Services Tax on purchase of farmland

### Consider George's case

George has been farming potatoes in Trentham as part of the family business for many years. He has finally gathered together enough funds to purchase his first farming property. George is concerned about the Goods & Services Tax (GST) applicable to the purchase as the vendor is registered for GST and has indicated there may be GST charged on top of the purchase price.

### **GST Implications**

There will be no GST applicable to the purchase of farmland if the following conditions are met.

- The land was used for a farming business for at least five years immediately before the sale; and
- The buyer intends to use it for a farming business; and
- Both parties to the contract are registered for GST; and
- The contract clearly specifies there will be no GST charged.

In review of these conditions, George has confirmed with the vendor that they have been operating a farming business on the property for over five years and that they are GST registered. George also intends to run a farming business on the land, has himself registered for GST and confirmed with his legal representative that the contract correctly identified the transaction is to be GST free purchase of farming land

## THE ART OF CHANGING LIVES
